Sheriff Holder returned on Sunday from witnessing the execution of W. G. Magers at Dallas, Polk county, on Friday last. Mr. Holder's account of the ghastly proceedings differs in some respects from that we get from other sources. He says there were but 150 people present, and that the condemned man took his stand on the scaffold without a quiver of any kind, facing his awful doom with a manly fortitude worthy of a better cause. He advanced to the scaffold with his arms pinioned, when Sheriff Van Orsdel proceeded with the unpleasant task of strapping his legs and adjusting the noose round his neck, which was accomplished with such dispatch that the condemned man was launched into eternity 60 seconds from the time he took his stand over the fatal trap, a drop of 5 or 6 feet being sufficient to break his neck and sever the spinal cord. Death was instantaneous, no struggles being noticed by the spectators except a slight clenching of the hands and twitching of the muscles. Mr. Holder says that he would be willing to undertake such a performance as that forced upon the sheriff of Polk county, but that he would much rather not undertake the job.

A Chinese funeral, conducted in the customary manner, is not often seen in The Dalles. That of the wife of Dock Sing, the merchant, which took place this afternoon, was perhaps as near it as any ever held here, although it was not nearly so elaborate as those seen in cities. The service which took place at the house was equal to a circus to those who could not understand their meaning. After arranging the body in the coffin it was carried onto the sidewalk and a ceremony of a half hour's length took place, composed of all manner of maneuvers which were "Greek" or "China" to the spectators. Among other things a table was set, with all sorts of eatables thereon, and the coffin placed high so that the deceased could eat. A long procession of carriages filled with Chinese followed the remains to their burying ground adjoining the city cemetery, and on the hearse sat a Chinaman tossing abroad small pieces of paper filled with holes, through which it is said the devil must pass before reaching the departed. There were perhaps 200 people at the cemetery, where tapers were burned, and another long ceremony took place. Here the belongings of the dead woman, no matter how elegant or costly, were piled up and burned, and as the grave was filled in all kinds of food was thrown in, upon which she is supposed to feed on her long journey.—Dalles Chronicle.

MOORE, Moro, Or.—Dear Sir: Your kind letter was duly received, and I had expected to see you this week, but our wise board of health have again quarantined against Moro, so no one can come here from there, or if any of us should go there, he would not be allowed to return. If he succeeded in running the gauntlet, they would quarantine him for 15 days after his return. They have also shut up the schools, churches, lodges, and played the dickens generally with every public gathering except the saloon, bowling alley and billiard rooms, which are allowed to gather as large crowds both day and night as their peculiar inducements and ingenuity in presenting attractions can draw. This board has not seen fit to give a reason for this. No doubt they think it is so apparent that no explanation should be necessary; and, indeed, every one ought to know, that on account of their well-known exemplary habits, purity of life, regular hours, extreme cleanliness of person, disposition to remain quietly at home and not roam from place to place, and great care and caution, when by chance they are compelled to associate with strangers, such persons as frequent saloons, bowling alleys and billiard rooms are not expected to, and cannot catch and carry and spread contagion and disease like that class of people who have the habit of sending their children to school, attending lodge sometimes, or going to church. So some of us at least are very proud of our board of health, and think no other city can possibly have one like it.
