The editor of the Wasco News is very modest in his estimate of our cases of smallpox, giving the number as 72. These little slips of the pen are not only a detriment to our town, which we naturally think they are meant to be, but help to frighten people from the county altogether. This disease is scattered all over the coast, and it is hardly fair to give Sherman county a black eye by making out the county seat a veritable pest-house, when, if the truth were known, we have no greater number of cases of this epidemic than other towns on the coast. Wasco ordered a strict quarantine against us, and we had a perfect right to return the compliment, particularly so, if we think the disease there is of a more virulent form than that here. 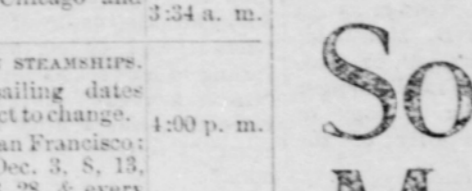
