The 88th anniversary and 31st celebration of Founders' Day was held at Champeo park May 2.

The apple crop of Lane county is very promising, says C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. From present indications the crop will be very large, he said.

The recent cold snap did more damage to fruit in the Ontario district than growers first estimated. The worst damage was to cherries and Delicious apples.

Canby entertained more than 10,000 visitors at the annual tulip festival, which proved to be the biggest event in the history of the bulb industry in that community.

The 3-year-old son of William Chapelle died at Eugene after swallowing a small quantity of carbolic acid at the family home. The child found the bottle while playing.

Damage estimated at \$20,000 was done to the Rethmiller department store in Freewater by a fire which broke out in the basement and spread to the lower floor.

The Redmond swimming pool is nearing completion and plans are under way to beautify the grounds surrounding it. The work is sponsored by the Garden club.

Quite a number of Burnside poultrymen in Clatsop county are receiving their spring chicks. In spite of the low price of eggs, no poultryman is going out of business.

With destroyers going to Coos bay and Astoria, the Newport chamber of commerce recently urged Senator McNary to send vessels of the same type to Yaquina bay July 4.

Claiming that white men have robbed them of their ancestral hunting grounds, the Warm Springs Indians have filed at Washington a claim against the government for \$5,100,000.

In the presence of a large group of citizens, the Natural Gas corporation was put into active service at Cottage Grove by Mayor Glass, who turned the switch opening the flow of gas into the mains.

Miss Valeta Story was chosen Queen of the May, and reigned over the festival held at Sweet Home on May Day.

James C. Henderson, Portland, was re-elected president of the Oregon Christian Endeavor society at the close of the state convention at Medford.

No exclusive franchise will be given airplanes to fly on the local beach at Seaside this summer, according to a recent decision of the city council. Definite regulations will be enforced to protect all on the beach.

A barn on the Bernard place, west of Carlton, in which E. L. Cabe operates his chicken and turkey hatchery, has been destroyed by fire. Young turkeys and chicks and several thousand incubating eggs were lost.

No trace of the dust storm which visited Oregon and Washington during the week past was visible at Marshfield. Coos Bay seems to have been one of the favored sections, as no appreciable amount of damage occurred.

A mirage was seen recently by the bridge tender crew of the Southern Pacific crossing north of North Bend. It appeared to be brought up from the Pacific many miles away. Several ships and high waves were observed.

Larkspur weed has caused a heavy loss of cattle to William Klittridge of Klamath Marsh. While driving a band of 1300 from Harney county across the high desert 800 of the band were poisoned by the deadly weed. Bill Hanley is also reported to have lost 67 head from the same cause.

Fire swept through the buildings of the Prineville fair grounds, destroying the cattle and horse barns, the sheep and hog shed and the racehorse paddock. Only the grandstand, the exhibit building and the dairy products pavilion were saved by a wind from the northeast which fanned the flames.

Eighteen men and women who have lived in Salem for 70 or more years, were honored at a luncheon by the Salem chamber of commerce. Judge Peter P. Arcey, 73 years a resident of

Salem, presided. He is past president of the Oregon Pioneers association. Members of the state fair board also attended the luncheon.

The warm east wind prevailing during the recent dust storm and since has done considerable damage to the spring-planted trees around Hood River. The warm wind dries out the trunk of the trees and retards the flow of sap and the tree dies. The growers who painted their trees with paraffin escaped the ravages of the warm east wind.

Alfred Kenyon, a farmer of the Deer creek district, near Grants Pass, is recovering after having been attacked by a cougar. Kenyon was building a fence when the animal attacked him. Seizing an ax, the farmer fought back. Lloyd Kenyon, his brother, rushed to the scene with dogs and a rifle. The cougar was tamed a short distance away and killed.

A. H. Craven, a farmer living a mile southeast of Monmouth, believes that the section was visited by a slight seismic disturbance during the dust storm. For 30 hours the wall on his farm exhibited peculiar indications, all water being a dirty clay color, quite unfit for drinking. The mixture did not readily separate into sediment, remaining rather a thin, rolled mud.

Confederated tribes of Willamette valley Indians held a meeting recently in St. Louis. Among those attending the powwow were Indians from southern Oregon, Grande Ronde, the Siletz county and various parts of Willamette valley.
