Principal Events of the Week
Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

There were further festivities in the afternoon, and in the evening President and Mrs. Chase held a reception. Doctor Chase, who was formerly president of the University of North Carolina, has been acting president since last July, when he succeeded Dr. David Kinley. There was a note of sorrow in Friday's celebration, for Dr. E. A. Alderman, president of the University of Virginia, who was to have taken part in the program, passed away on the train on his way to Grana; and only a few days before word had come of the death of Mrs. Kinley in Shanghai, China.

Herman Oliver of John Day was re-elected president of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association at the concluding session of the annual meeting at John Day recently. W. B. Snyder of Paisley was elected first vice-president and Wayne Stewart of Dayville second vice-president.

More than 20 planes from Spokane, Vancouver and Seattle army fields were in The Dalles recently to participate in the dedication of The Dalles airport. The field was named Walter E. Case airport in honor of the ex-army pilot who was killed last October while flying the mail up the Columbia gorge in a fog.

The Apple Growers' association has closed its pools of Delicious, Winter Banna apples and Bose pears, and a distribution of \$150,000 is now being made to cover the proceeds of these varieties, as well as a partial payment on the Newton apples and D'Anjou pears. The final distribution will not be made until late in the summer.

Mrs. John Couch of Leap, near Wallowa, was seriously injured at their ranch when she was dragged and kicked in the face by a horse from which she was dismounting. Her foot caught in a stirrup when the horse became frightened by the rattle of matches in a box she was carrying. Both of her cheekbones and her nose were broken.

A crowd of 150 enthusiastic people gathered recently 23 miles north of Lakeview where the new Lakeview-Burns highway branches off from the Fremont highway to attend the ceremonies arranged by the Lake county chamber of commerce and the Lake county court to commemorate the beginning of construction on the new road.

Deer are dying in the Brewster valley section near Marshfield. A half dozen have been found during the last week and one resident reported that a big buck was so sick he could not move out of his tracks. No marks of injury have been found on any of the animals. One solution put forth is that of poison bait, as deer will lick tallow.

Brigadier-General White has received information from Washington that the state of Oregon will receive an additional \$50,000 for the improvement of facilities at Camp Clatsop. This money is Oregon's share of a million-dollar appropriation authorized by congress for the war department.

That spring is here to stay is the firm belief of Hood River orchardists, who are now preparing to put on their dormant sprays. Pruning has been in progress for two weeks. Many of the orchardists have announced that they will prune very lightly this season, for economic reasons, in view of the fact that no profits will be made from last season's apple and pear crop.

Tillamook cheese once more will be made in Blaine, it was announced recently. Five years ago cheese making at that place was given up and milk and cream were marketed by various methods, but none proved satisfactory. The shareholders in the Upper Ne-tucca Cheese association held several meetings in an effort to have the factory ready by the time the spring milk flow started.
