TRAFFIC ANSWERS

any person upon receiving a record
of the conviction of such person of
any of the following crimes:

1. Manslaughter resulting from
the operation of a motor vehicle.
2. Driving a vehicle while under
the influence of intoxicating liquor
or narcotic drugs.
3. Perjury or the making of a false
affidavit to the secretary of state un-
der this act or any other law of this
state requiring registration of motor
vehicles or regulating their operation
on highways.

4. Any crime punishable as a felo-
ny under the motor vehicle laws of
this state or any other felony in the
commission of which a motor vehicle
is used.

5. Conviction or forfeiture of bail
upon three charges of reckless driv-
ing all within the preceding 12
months.

6. A conviction of a driver of a
motor vehicle, involved in an acci-
dent resulting in the death or injury
of another person, upon a charge of
failure to stop and disclose his iden-
tity at the scene of the accident.
(Page 94, section 18a)

(b) The secretary of state, upon
receiving a record of the conviction
of any person upon a charge of op-
erating a motor vehicle while the li-
cense of such person is suspended or
revoked, shall immediately extend
the period of such first suspension or
revocation for an additional like pe-
riod.

18. Q. When may your license
be suspended or revoked?
Ans. The secretary of state may
immediately suspend the license of
any person without hearing and with-
out receiving a record or conviction

of such person of crime whenever the
secretary of state has reason to be-
lieve:

1. That such person has commit-
ted any offense for the conviction of
which mandatory revocation of li-
cense is provided in section 18.

2. That such person has, by reck-
less or unlawful operation of a motor
vehicle, caused or contributed to an
accident resulting in death or injury
to any other person or serious prop-
erty damage.

3. That such person is incompe-
tent to drive a motor vehicle or is af-
flicted with mental or physical in-
firmities or disabilities rendering it
unsafe for such person to drive a
motor vehicle upon the highways.

4. That such person is a habitual
offender or negligent driver of a
motor vehicle or has committed a
serious violation of the motor vehicle
laws of this state. (Page 95, section
19a)

19. Q. What recourse does an
operator have if his license is sus-
pended?
Ans. He will be afforded an oppor-
tunity of a hearing before the secre-
tary of state in the county where he
resides. (Page 95, section 19a)

20. Q. For what reasons may a
license be suspended or revoked?
Ans. For the same reasons as a
resident. (Page 95, section 19b)

21. Q. If you commit an offense
in another state, which if committed
in this state would be sufficient
grounds for the suspension or revoca-
tion of a license, how might this af-
fect your Oregon license?
Ans. The secretary of state may
suspend or revoke a license upon re-
ceiving notice of such conviction.
(Page 95, section 19c)

22. Q. What recourse does a per-
son have who has been denied a li-
cense or whose license has been re-
voked by the secretary of state?
Ans. He may file a petition within
30 days for a hearing in the circuit
court of the county of which he is a
resident and the matter will be set
for hearing, except in those cases
where the revocation of a license is
mandatory. (Page 96, section 20)

23. Q. Is it lawful to loan a li-
cense; to borrow a license; to operate
on a license that has been suspen-
ded, suspended, or altered, or to
fail or refuse to surrender to the se-
cretary of state upon demand any op-
erator's or chauffeur's license which
has been suspended, canceled, or re-
voked as provided by law?
Ans. No. (Page 97, section 22)

24. Q. What is the penalty for
making false statement in your appli-
cation?
Ans. This is perjury, punishable
by fine or imprisonment and the man-
datory revocation of your license.
(Page 97, section 23, and section 18a
page 94)

25. Q. Is it lawful for parents to
allow their children to operate with-
out a license?
Ans. No. (Page 98, section 24)

26. Q. Is it lawful to employ an
unlicensed chauffeur?
Ans. No. (Page 98, section 25)

27. Q. Is it lawful for the owner
of an automobile to allow anyone to
operate the car in violation of any
law?
Ans. No. (Page 98, section 26)

28. Q. What is the penalty for
violating any provision of the uni-
form operator's and chauffeur's li-
cense act?
Ans. It shall be a misdemeanor
unless other laws declare it to be a
felony. (Page 98, section 28)

29. Q. Do other states examine
operators?
Ans. Yes. California, Connecti-
cut, District of Columbia, Maryland,
Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New
Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania,
Rhode Island and Vermont have a
similar law and Oregon's law shall be
so construed as to make the laws uni-
form in these states. (Page 99, sec-
tion 32)

**LAWS REGULATING TRAFFIC
ON HIGHWAYS**

30. Q. When is a person consid-
ered to have entered an intersection?
Ans. When the front point of car
crosses a line drawn from corner to
corner of curb. (Page 103, section
1u)

31. Q. What is a safety zone?
Ans. A place for the protection of
pedestrians. (Page 103, section 1v)

32. Q. Is it lawful to deface a
road sign?
Ans. No. (Page 110, section 14)

33. Q. Should one stop in case
of an accident?
Ans. Yes. The driver shall im-
mediately stop. Failure subjects of-
fender to imprisonment. (Page 110,
section 15)

34. Q. What information shall a
driver give in case of an accident?
Ans. Name, address, license num-
ber, name and address of passengers,
shall exhibit and give the number of
operator's or chauffeur's license, shall
render assistance to injured persons.
(Page 111, section 15e)

35. Q. Should accidents be re-
ported?
Ans. Yes, to the sheriff of the
county or chiefs of police. Page 111,
section 16)

36. Q. Is it lawful to operate a
car while under the influence of in-
toxicating liquor or narcotic drugs?
Ans. No. Persons convicted shall
be imprisoned in jail for 30 days to
one year and fined \$100 to \$1,000.
(Page 113, section 18b)

37. Q. Is the penalty more for a
second offense?
Ans. Yes. A subsequent convic-
tion shall be punishable by impris-
onment for 90 days to one year and the
court may inflict a fine of not more
than \$1,000. The secretary of state
must revoke the license. (Page 113,
section 18b)

38. Q. What is the charge if an
intoxicated driver kills a person?
Ans. Manslaughter. (Page 113,
section 16)

39. Q. How can the ownership of
a motor vehicle be determined?
Ans. The person appearing on re-
cord as licensee may be considered the
owner. (Page 114, section 18d)

40. Q. What constitutes reckless
driving?
Ans. Driving carelessly and heed-
lessly, in willful or wanton disregard
of the rights or safety of others, or
without due caution or circumspec-
tion or at a speed or in the manner so
as to endanger, or be likely to endan-
ger a person or property. (Page 114,
section 19a)

41. Q. What is meant by basic
rule?
Ans. It means that no person shall
drive a motor vehicle upon the high-
way at a speed which is greater than
is reasonable and prudent having due
regard to traffic, surface and the
width of the highway and the hazard
at intersections and any other con-
ditions then existent; which means that

a person shall not drive at a speed
greater than will permit him to exer-
cise proper control of the vehicle and
to decrease speed or to stop as may
be necessary to avoid a collision.
(Page 115, section 20a)

42. Q. What are the indicated
speeds under the new law?
Ans. Fifteen miles per hour:

(a) When passing a school
building or the grounds thereof dur-
ing school recess or while children
are going to or leaving school during
opening or closing hours; provided,
however, that when a crosswalk is
marked upon the pavement and is be-
ing used by a pedestrian, vehicles
shall come to a complete stop and
yield the right of way to such pedes-
trian in such crosswalk; or

(b) When approaching within 100
feet of a grade crossing of a steam,
electric or street railway where the
driver's view of such crossing or of
any traffic on such railway within a
distance of 400 feet in either direc-
tion is obstructed.

2. Twenty miles per hour:
(a) In any business district as de-
fined herein; or
(b) Upon approaching within 50
feet and in traversing an intersection
of highways where the driver's view
is obstructed along any highway in-
tersecting highway within a distance
of 200 feet is obstructed, except that
when traveling upon a through street
or at traffic controlled intersections
the district speed shall apply.

3. Twenty-five miles per hour:
(a) In any residential district as
defined herein; or
(b) At any railway grade cross-
ing where the view is not obstructed;
or

(c) In public parks within cities,
unless a different speed is indicated
by local authorities along any posted.
4. Forty-five miles per hour:
Outside of business or residence
districts, except as otherwise limited
by this act.

43. Q. Can speed traps be used
to secure evidence of speed viola-
tions?
Ans. No. (Page 116, section 20d)

44. Q. When may local authori-
ties indicate higher speeds?
Ans. Local authorities in their re-
spective jurisdictions may indicate by
ordinance higher speeds than those
indicated by the state upon through
highways or upon highways or por-
tions thereof where there are no in-
tersections or between widely spaced
intersections, provided signs are er-
ected giving notice of said indicated
speed by local authorities; but they
shall not change the basic rule, nor
in any event indicate a speed in ex-
cess of 45 miles. (Page 117, section
21)

45. Q. Are there any rules against
driving too slow?
Ans. It is unlawful for any person
unnecessarily to drive at such a slow
speed as to impede or block the nor-
mal and reasonable movement of
traffic, except when reduced speed is
necessary for safe operation. (Page
117, section 22)

46. Q. When are speed limits not
applicable?
Ans. In an emergency when driv-
ers of authorized emergency vehicles
have given audible signal by bell,
siren, or exhaust whistle. (Page 119,
section 25)

47. Q. Are speed contests on the
roads or streets of this state allowed?
Ans. No. (Page 119, section 25a)

48. Q. When should you drive
on the right side of the highway?
Ans. At all times unless the right
half is out of repair or for some other
reason it is necessary to pass or over-
take and passing another vehicle or
when making a left hand turn at an
intersection. (Page 120, sections 26
and 27)

49. Q. Upon a highway, which is
divided into three lanes, where should
a vehicle be driven?
Ans. In the right hand lane, ex-
cept when overtaking and passing an-
other vehicle or in preparation for a
left turn. (Page 121, section 27c)

50. Q. In meeting another vehicle,
how should you proceed?
Ans. Drivers of vehicles proceed-
ing in opposite directions should pass
each other to the right, each giving
the other at least one-half of the
main travel portion of the roadway
as nearly as possible. Page 121, sec-
tion 28)

51. Q. In passing another vehicle
how should you proceed?
Ans. The driver of a vehicle, over-
taking another vehicle proceeding in
the same direction, shall after giving
audible warning with his horn, or
other warning device, pass to the left
thereof at a safe distance and shall
not again drive to the right side of
the highway until safely clear of such
overtaken vehicle. (Page 121, sec-
tion 29a and 29d)

52. Q. Is it lawful to increase
your speed when being passed by an-
other vehicle?
Ans. No. (Page 121, section 29b)

53. Q. Is it ever lawful to pass
another vehicle going in the same di-
rection upon the right?
Ans. In the event two or more
vehicles are moving in the same di-
rection in parallel lines upon the
right half of the paved portion of a
city street, or any hard surfaced high-
way, having space for two or more
lanes of traffic in each direction, ve-
hicles in the right-hand lane may
overtake or pass those in the left-
hand lane, provided that any over-
taking vehicle shall not exceed the in-
dicated speed for the district.

Also, a driver may overtake and
pass upon the right another vehicle
which is making or about to make a
left turn. (Page 121, section 29e)

54. Q. When is it unlawful to pass
another vehicle on the left of another
vehicle going in the same direction?
Ans. When such left side is not
clearly visible or free of on-coming
traffic for a sufficient distance ahead
to permit such overtaking and pass-
ing to be completely made without
impeding the safe operation of any
vehicle approaching from the oppo-
site direction, or any vehicle over-
taken, nor shall the driver of a ve-
hicle in any event drive to the left
side of the center line of the highway
when approaching the crest of a grade
or upon a curve in the highway when
the driver's view along that highway
is obstructed within a distance of 500
feet. (Page 122, section 30a)

55. Q. What distance must be
maintained between trucks or motor
buses when traveling upon the open
highway?
Ans. 300 feet, except when over-
taking and passing another. (Page
122, section 31b)

56. Q. When operating a motor
vehicle what should you do upon re-
ceiving the signal given by raising
the hand from a person driving or
leading a horse or horses or other an-
imals in the opposite direction?

Ans. Bring such motor vehicle im-
mediately to a stop and remain so as
long as may be reasonable to allow
such animal or animals to pass. (Page
123, section 31a)

57. Q. How should you approach a
right turn?
Ans. In the lane for traffic nearest
to the right-hand side of the high-
way. (Page 123, section 32a)

58. Q. How should you approach a
left turn?
Ans. In the lane for traffic to the
right of and nearest the center line
of the highway. (Page 123, section
32b)

59. Q. How should you signal a
right turn; a left turn; stop?
Ans. By extending the hand and
arm upward and beyond the left side
of the vehicle.

By extending the hand and arm
horizontally from and beyond the left
side of the vehicle.

By extending the hand and arm
downward from and beyond the left
side of the vehicle. (Page 124, sec-
tion 33)

60. Q. How long should signal be
given before making turn or stop?
Ans. During the last 50 feet before
turning or stopping. (Page 124, sec-
tion 33b)

61. Q. When is it unlawful to turn
around upon a highway?
Ans. Upon any curve or upon the
approach to or near the crest of a
grade or at any place upon the high-
way where the view of vehicle mak-
ing the turn is obstructed within a
distance of 500 feet along the high-
way in any direction. (Page 125,
section 34)

62. Q. Who has the right of way
at an intersection?
Ans. The driver of a vehicle ap-
proaching an intersection shall yield
the right of way to a vehicle which
has first entered the intersection.
When two vehicles enter an intersec-
tion at the same time the driver of
the vehicle on the left shall yield to
the driver on the right. Any driver
entering an intersection at an un-
lawful speed shall forfeit any right of
way which he would otherwise have.
(Page 125, section 35a)

63. Q. How long must a driver of
a vehicle who has stopped at a through
highway yield the right of way?
Ans. The driver of any vehicle,
who has stopped as required by law
at the entrance to a through high-
way, shall yield to the other vehicles
within the intersection or approach-
ing so closely as to constitute an im-
mediate hazard. But said driver hav-
ing so yielded may proceed and other
vehicles approaching on the through
highway shall yield to him. (Page
125, section 35b)

64. Q. How long shall a driver of
a vehicle yield the right of way when
turning left at an intersection?
Ans. The driver of a vehicle within
an intersection intending to turn to
the left shall yield to any vehicle ap-
proaching from the opposite direction,
which is within the intersection or so
close thereto as to constitute an im-
mediate hazard, but said driver, hav-
ing so yielded and having given a
signal when and as required by law,
may make such left turn and other
vehicles approaching the intersection

shall yield to the driver making the
left turn. (Page 125, section 35c)

65. Q. What are some exceptions to
rules regarding right of way?
Ans. (a) The driver of a vehicle
entering the public highway from a
private road or drive shall yield the
right of way to all vehicles approach-
ing on such public highway. (Page
125, section 36a)

(b) The driver of a vehicle upon a
highway shall yield the right of way
to all authorized emergency vehicles
when the latter are operated in emer-
gency when the drivers thereof
sound audible signal by bell, siren,
or exhaust whistle. (Page 125, sec-
tion 36b)

66. Q. What should you do upon
the approach of an authorized emer-
gency vehicle?
Ans. Upon the approach
