OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Port Orford schools have opened
with the largest attendance in their
history. In the high school 47 pupils
were enrolled and in the grade schools
75. Additional registration in sight
will bring the high school total to 55.

Turkey growers of Klamath county
have voted to form a marketing as-
sociation to affiliate with the Oregon
Turkey Growers' association. The or-
ganization will market on a co-opera-
tive plan. Approximately 6000 birds
will be sent from Klamath county this
fall.

R. C. Stoneman, government hunter,
killed the first grizzly bear that has
been seen in the country around Enter-
prise for nearly 35 years. The bear
had killed 65 sheep in the Cheamianus
neighborhood in the past few weeks.
It is estimated that he weighed about
500 pounds.

Use of sulphur on alfalfa in the
John Day vicinity this season has
caused increased yields of as high as
25 per cent over checked plots left
untreated. On the Oliver brothers'
ranch results were not noted until the
second cutting, but it was very pro-
nounced then.

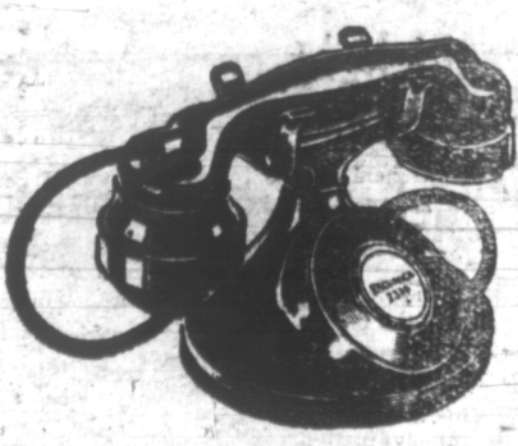
