

Topographical Map Being Made of District

Farmers living near the high points of the south end of the county have been somewhat puzzled to see two very business like looking men building towers of varying height on these high places. Guesses about the use to which these towers were to be put have varied from aeroplanes beacon lights to just found graves of ancestors and strange rites of a new religious sect. None of these guesses are correct.

The towers are being built by two men from the United States Geological Survey office in Sacramento who are making a topographical map of the Moro quadrangle. These towers are used to sight from and obtain the correct angles with which to make an accurate map.

A. H. Andrews is in charge of the work and is assisted by P. S. Pestman who is the large and footy looking young man. The Moro quadrangle is 30 minutes long or in more common phraseology it is 35.7 miles north and south and is approximately 25 miles east and west. These quadrangles change in size with the distance from the north pole.

The north line of the quadrangle will be nearly a mile north of the base line on DeMoss hill and will extend south to somewhere in the neighborhood of Shaniko.

These maps are used by road builders, the war department and any other persons or industry needing an accurate plat of the surface contours of the districts mapped.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:

Delegates from 22 community groups in the territory between Seaside and Ocean Park, Wash., along both sides of the Columbia river as far east as Vancouver, met in Clatskanie recently for the fall conference of the Lower Columbia Associated Chambers of Commerce.

Ten thousand game birds have been released from the eastern Oregon game farm at Pendleton during the past year. Among the game birds is a new species known as the Melanistic mutant, which is like a pheasant but black in color and larger than the pheasant. It is also more hardy.

Prunes are being made into jam, cherries are being dried, and salmon is being canned for the relief of the needy of The Dalles section. Low prices have existed on the three commodities. Prunes are being picked by Boy Scouts at the Williams orchard, and The Dalles Co-operative Growers' association is handling the canning.

In the 1931 directory just received in the principals office from the North West Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the Wasco high school is the smallest school in the state of Oregon which was on the accredited list of secondary high schools last year. Only two other schools in the state with an enrollment of less than 100 are on the accredited list, namely, Newport and Central Point.

The first Monthly School Report at the end of the first report month shows a total enrollment of 144 students, 76 boys and 68 girls. Last year during the same period the enrollment was 139.

With the first four weeks of school just closed classes and instruction have been organized and the pupils have gotten down to the routine of studying again. With this accomplished other plans are now under way for the organization of the extra curricular program for the year. It will be expected of each pupil in high school to participate at least twice a week in some form of activity during the activity period. The program as outlined in this work will include journalism, with the possible publication of a school paper, dramatics, or public speaking or debate, preparation for programs for student assemblies, and one or two other clubs that have not been definitely formed. A teacher will be in charge of each of these activities.
