George Darling, 48, was gored to death by a bull at the C. K. Fisher farm west of Haines.

The building housing the Westport Lumber company store was practically destroyed by fire recently.

W. G. Armstrong, rancher six miles south of Ontario, has a hog weighing 900 pounds. The porker is of the Red Duroc breed and is 2 years old.

Eight Washington county school districts have voted to organize a union high school district centering in Dayton. The unofficial vote was 203 to 69.

An organization to be known as the Baker Valley Irrigation association has been formed to construct a dam on Powder river to irrigate 20,000 acres below Baker.

More than 120 nut growers from Oregon, Washington and California attended the sessions of the annual convention of the Western Nut Growers' association in Eugene.

The first car of Indian ponies to be shipped this season left Gateway last week. They were billed to Slusher Brothers of Portland by A. C. Martin. About 25 cars were shipped from there last year.

Victims of either home-canned fruit or home-smoked salmon, Mrs. Desdemona St. Louis, 67, and her son, Harold, 35, died at their home in Glendon, 15 miles north of Newport on the Coast highway.

Senator Steiner has been advised that bids will be asked within a month for a new boathouse for the coast guard station at Bandon, and construction will be completed within the present fiscal year.

The proposed co-operative organization of milk producers was put into effect in Corvallis December 1, with the co-operation of the distributors, who have agreed to purchase all market milk and cream supplies from the association members.

The new South Prairie school building in district No. 2 of Tillamook county, was dedicated with appropriate exercises. The new building is the result of the consolidation of three school districts, Harmony, Fawcett creek and South Prairie.

The first dividend will be paid the depositors of the defunct Commercial State Bank of Springfield as soon as the checks can be made out and mailed. More than \$28,000 will be distributed.

The Evans Products company plant in Marshfield will install a flooring department about January 1, employing about 50 men, James H. Halley, general manager, announced. A carload of specially designed flooring equipment, valued at several thousand dollars, was received last week.

According to the records of The Dalles chamber of commerce the total rainfall for this year will not reach that of 1926 and 1927. The moisture since September 1 to date is far in excess of that of a similar period during the last four years. It is predicted that a wet cycle is beginning.
