## WHEAT MEETING

small groups each with its elected officers, its storage facilities and attention to the details attendant to its geographical position, second; finance, which department has used the money loaned the farm board by the government to aid cooperatives in getting started and making it possible to perfect organizations without much outlay of capital from individual farmers, third; an educational program designed to give growers correct and detailed information about the movement of grain crops throughout the world and the amount of such crops, and fourth; the much maligned stabilization branch of the farm board activities which was designed to act in an emergency to keep growers from suffering too heavily from an unfavorable market.

The Agricultural Marketing Act was not designed to help the farmer alone but to aid the entire country regain its balance after the disastrous economic conditions following the war. As no part of the industry of any nation can be prosperous without the remainder it is impossible for American industry to regain its feet without a much greater prosperity among the nation's farmers.

The reason stated by the speaker for the farm groups' insistence on either the debenture plan or the equalization fee plan was that with these it would not have been so necessary to organize the farmers and bring them into one group. Under the marketing act it is imperative that farmers be convinced of the value of the plan before they can be of help. With a sufficient sign-up it will be possible to adopt either of the above plans of any other that seems practical at the time.

Mr. Shumway defended the salaries paid the heads of the national organization by saying that when the amount of wheat handled was considered the salaries were less than the usual cost of handling wheat.

One and one-half cents per bushel is the charge made against wheat handled by the association. Of this sum one-quarter goes to the regional and the remaining cent is used for expenses necessary to buying and selling the grain.

At the beginning of the meeting a resolution was adopted protesting against the attitude of the extension service in their criticism of the farm board. This resolution empowered the president of the North Pacific Regional Grain Growers, A. R. Shumway, to obtain, if possible, a statement of the policy of the extension service in relation to the farm board.

Mr. Shumway and Mr. Dorman were speaking in place of "Farmer" Brown, who was scheduled to appear before the local audience. He was called back to the middle west and could not be here, but is expected to come to the county sometime next June. He is an economist for the farm board and is stated to have a thorough knowledge of cooperatives along with the ability to explain that knowledge.
