Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Checks are being mailed from Hood River by the Apple Growers association to members who are growers of Bartlett pears. These returns, the first to be made, are on the basis of \$30 per ton on No. 1 pears. The checks will total around \$30,000.

Sternberg's Saddle factory, which was destroyed by fire in Albany recently, will again operate in the wing of the building which partially survived the fire. Machinery will be installed and manufacture of orders on hand will start. The loss by fire was \$250,000.

The state highway department has started negotiations for right of way for construction of the south approach of the Old Oregon Trail to Baker. The new location will follow Bridge street to Elm, and down Elm to Indiana, to connect with the present highway at the city limits.
