The typing I class has a superior class average. Maxine Henrichs wrote a perfect 10 minute test at the rate of 20 words, and Flora Williams of the same class typed two tests at the rate of 18 and 24 net words in two 10 minute tests. Sybil Belash wrote a 10 test at the rate of 34 words with three errors.

NEW SWEATER IDEA

If you want to express your individuality in a sweater which has the exclusive hand-crochet look, here is an easy and quick way to do it. Purchase one of the ready-made wool sweaters at present low prices. Outline on it the yoke and cuffs you want. Run a double row of machine hemstitching around the outlines. Crochet your yoke and cuffs of number seventy mercerized crochet thread, using a number twelve steel crochet hook, working either french mesh or Irish crochet stitch. Next, cut away the sweater from under the yoke and cuffs and whip the mercerized mesh neatly in. The sweater shown in the picture is of dark green wool, with yoke and cuffs in ecru mercerized crocheted done in Irish mesh stitch.
