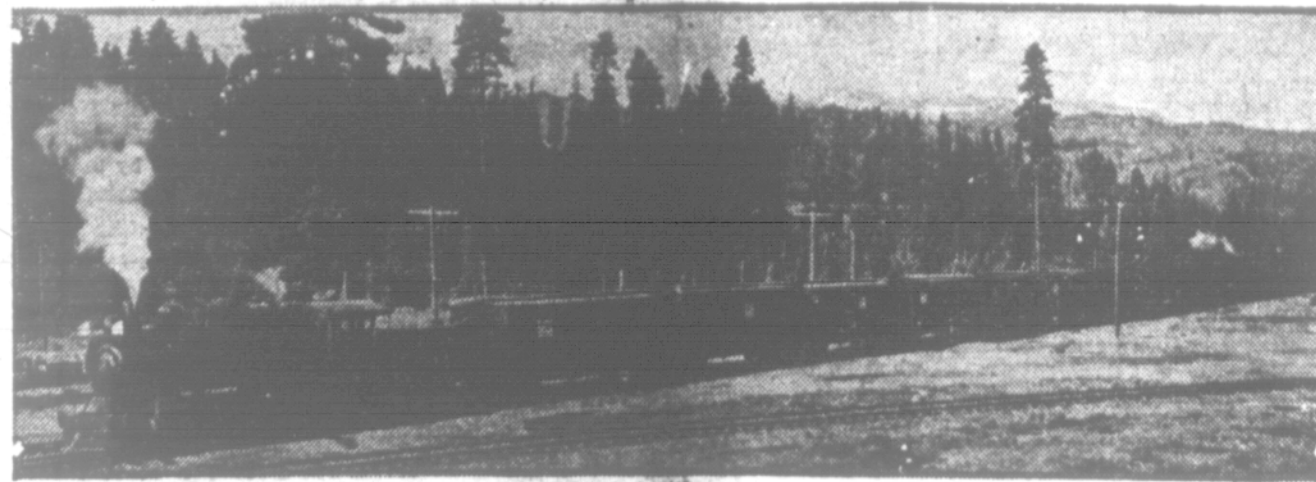

### Well Known Speakers To Appear At Wasco and Grass Valley

### BOTH MEETINGS SATURDAY

Adams, Shumway, Dorman and Davis Will Address Farmers

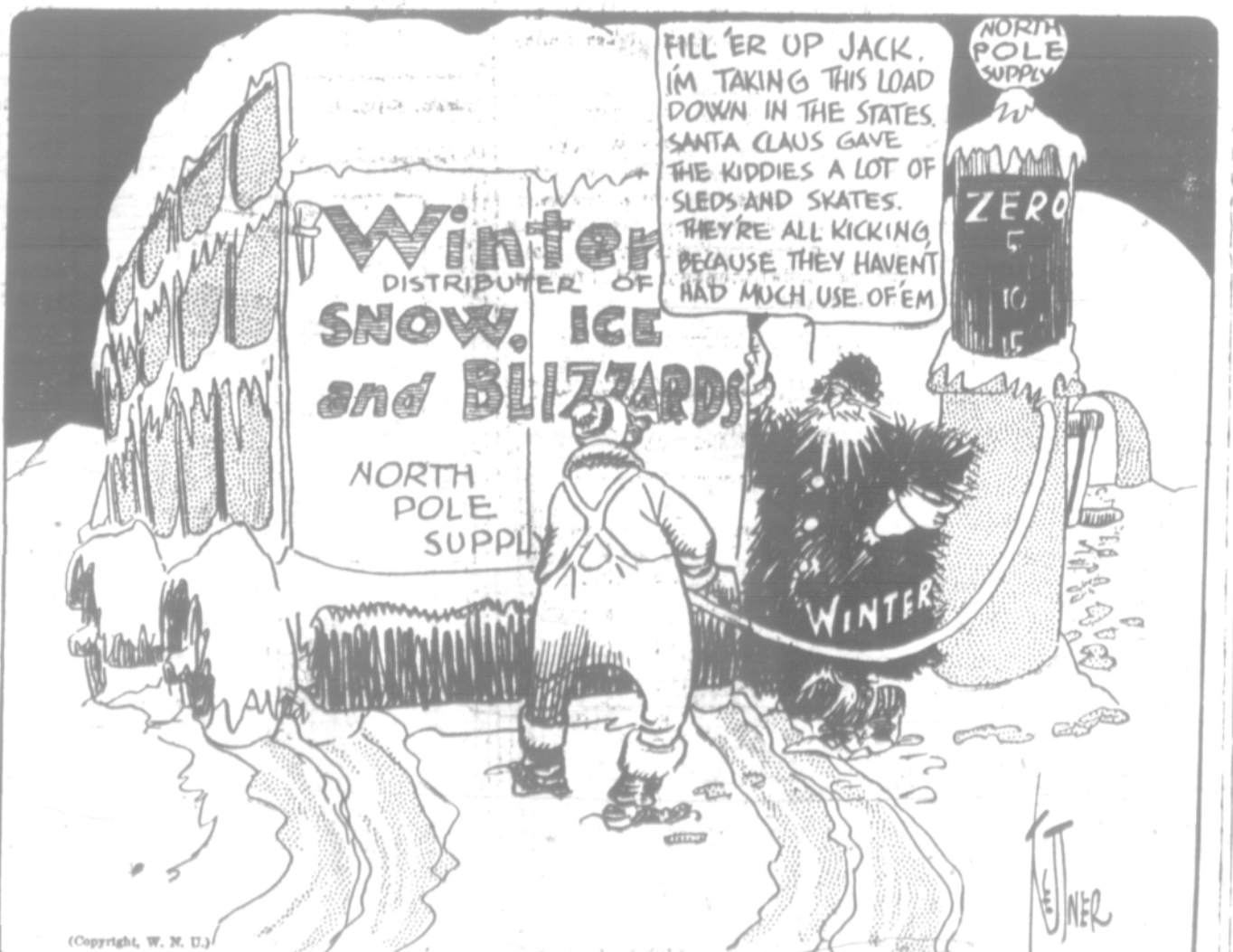
Two meetings will be held in the county next Saturday that will be of interest to all farmers whether members of the national cooperatives or not. One of these meetings will be held in the school auditorium at Wasco under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Sherman Grain Growers. Geo. E. Davis one of the economists of the federal farm board, will be one of the speakers and Alva R Shumway, president of the northwest grain growers will be the other. Mr. Shumway will discuss the book "Wheat and Politics" that has created something of a furor among opponents of cooperation.  
The second meeting will be held in the civic auditorium at Grass Valley being sponsored by the Grass Valley Grain Growers. Orris Dorman, director of the North Pacific, will be one of the speakers and he will talk on his favorite subject of cooperation. A C. Adam, secretary of the North Pacific will be the other speaker. He will explain and review the work of northwest cooperative during the past two years.  
The meeting at Wasco will open at two o'clock and the one at Grass Valley will convene at one thirty.  
These speakers are brought to the county by the local cooperatives for the purpose of acquainting local citizens, especially farmers, with the cooperative movement and everyone is invited to attend.
