OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

E. J. Dodge of Portland is preparing to establish a sawmill at Barton for the cutting of maple, alder and oak logs. He states he has many orders waiting to be filled.

A new industry is indicated at The Dalles in the announcement that more

than 100 tons of Kennewick asparagus will be canned by the Co-operative Growers this coming season.

Celebration of the completion of the new \$850,000 bridge over the Rogue river at Gold beach has been set definitely for May 28, it was announced by the state highway commission.

Short Sand beach, which was recently announced as the newest state park, the gift of E. S. Collins, has long been one of the favorite recreational spots in Tillamook county.

City authorities of Pendleton are seeking someone to fill a job. The "office" of city dog catcher is vacant, and some big, strong man with steel shins is wanted. The rate of payment is \$1 a dog.

Approximately 43 miles of rural power extensions were built in Josephine county in 1931 by the California-Oregon Power company, bringing electric service to about 150 farms and rural business firms.

A deer which raced across the Pacific highway a few miles north of Medford, slipping on the wet pavement and breaking its back, was delivered by state police to the Salvation Army at Medford.

Abolition of the office of city treasurer and city auditor and creation of the position of city auditor are advocated in the annual report of Police Judge Fouch of Klamath Falls. He would combine the office of city attorney and police judge.

Construction of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river during the coming summer is foreseen as a possibility as a result of a favorable report from the office of the district engineer, received from Washington, D. C.

The municipal light and water plants of Canby showed a net profit of \$526 in 1931 and this does not include street lights and water for fire protection, now furnished free, John Ed, city treasurer of Canby, announced.
