Election Year Brings Out Some Candidates

This is one of those years when office holders and would be office holders go about the county shaking hands, meeting new people, renewing acquaintance with old friends and talking about their qualifications.

So far the expected rush to the court house to get filing blanks for signatures has not materialized. The only persons who have their petitions out are three county officers, Sheriff Hugh Chrisman, Assessor Margaret Peetz and Clerk George Vintin.

Report has it that several others have their ear to the ground listening for the call to run for some office, but apparently the call has not been so loud as was expected or else prospective candidates are waiting until spring has made the roads a little better and the rain and snow has made the voters' faces a little brighter before announcing them selves.

This year will see the election of almost a complete outfit of county officers with the term of the sheriff, the clerk, the assessor, the school superintendent, the treasurer and one commissioner being finished. All candidates will have to have their petitions signed and filed with the county clerk about the first of April which means that they have about two months of grace.

Voters of the county also will have to vote for two state representatives of the district composed of Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler and Morrow counties and will select a senator for the district comprised of Sherman, Gilliam and Wheeler counties. So far there is one candidate for the senatorial position, J. P. Yates, of Wasco, having agreed to make the race. It is expected that Earl Snell, of Arlington will run for one of the house positions as he has a good chance to become speaker of the next house. R. W.

Turner, of Heppner has a chance that he will be a candidate in another office.

when moisture conditions are better even if moisture falls during the life of the plant. This rule may not work this year as surely as it has in the past because of the fact that little of the wheat sown last fall has come through the ground yet and started its growing period.

Optimists claim, however, that we have definitely broken the dry cycle and may expect rainfall with more frequency than for the past three years.
