crossing two wheats. This is done by fertilizing one plant with the pollen of another. It is a job requiring much care and attention on the part of the breeder. Wheats with very varied characteristics may be crossed and from them may be gotten almost endless varieties.

Mr. Yates, the second speaker on the program, gave some interesting figures and other information on the freight rates that have become so onerous a burden on the wheat farmer since the fall in the price of that product. He stated that the railroads admit that they lost as much as \$425,000,000 per year from passenger traffic which must be made up from revenues derived from the freight hauls.

The roads have purchased bus lines and advertised fares on them and the railroads as well that cannot possibly pay the cost of operation. Also new passenger equipment and services are continually being put into use all at the expense of those who must ship their products by rail.

As an instance of the ability of the railroads to go after business when they thought it advisable, he cited the gasoline transportation business between Portland and Sherman County points. A few years ago the roads hauled about 130 cars of gasoline into this county. Because rates were too high the trucks gradually took this business for themselves and now the railroads are reducing rates in an effort to recover this lost trade again.

He also spoke briefly in favor of

the oleo tax that would protect the dairyman against the competition of oleo and gave some figures to show the extent of this competition. It was announced by the speaker that at some time within the next three months O. M. Plummer will come to Wasco to address the people of the county under the auspices of the Auxiliary.

boasted of but seldom accomplished on the old road. It does look impossible as one rounds the curve near the bottom and looks afar up the hillside to where the new part of the grade can be seen on the point, but the new grade does not exceed seven and a half per cent whereas the old one was over twelve in places.

After Saturday night the two men who are finishing the fencing will come home and the cabins will be empty except that one occupied by Mrs. Ruby Pettys who will have a long time of it since the laughing and joking crew are gone.

Geological formations along the right of way are peculiar as they change every half mile.

The upper part is dug out of very ordinary volcanic rock; the first cut is through monstrous boulders whose corners have been rounded by some older event than eruption from Mt. Hood. The short stretch thru camp is dug out of heavy clay and peculiar looking formations are to be found all along the road. The well that was

dug in the little flat where the camp was placed is fourteen feet deep and no powder was used in digging it. It is in almost solid clay, a few feet above it is the upper cut with the huge boulders.

Although it is a road that will attract considerable attention from both the local citizens who are accustomed to looking at deep canyons from curving grades and from tourists who are always looking for a new thrill in the picturesque and grand view of great spaces.

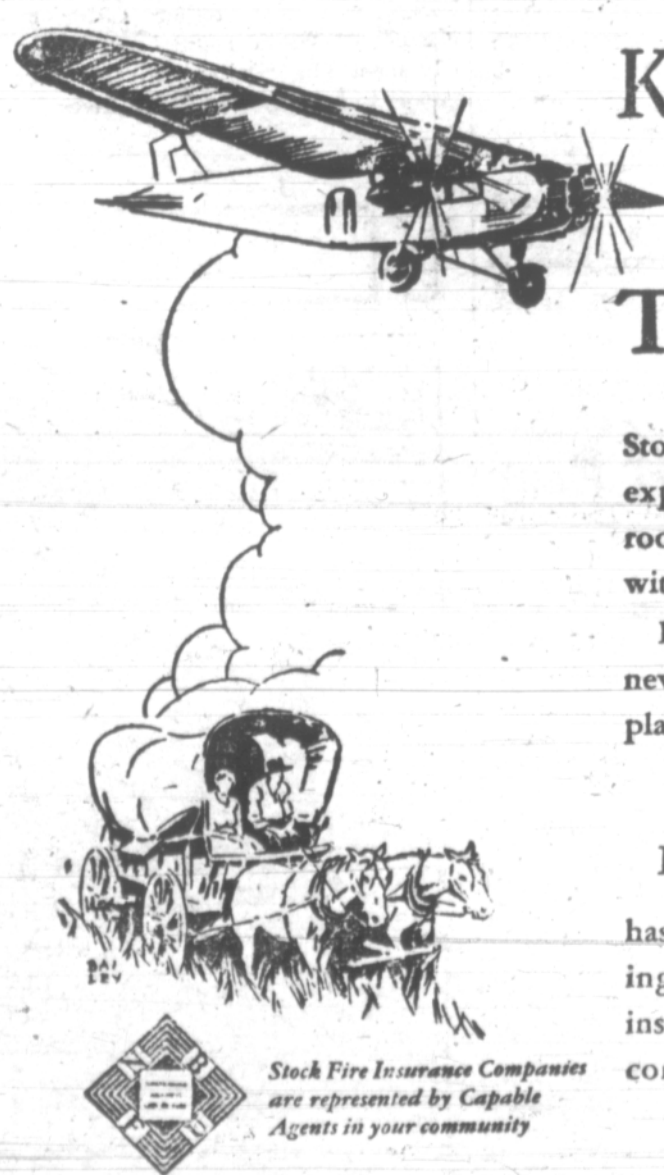
