charge of bank liquidations to make loans of any sort to borrowers for any purpose. However, Mr. Schram states, that in the case of the Moro State Bank he has been persuaded by Mr. Coppock to allow some loans as they appeared necessary to insure a crop of wheat which is the only means borrowers have of repaying the depositors money. It was reported at the meeting that up to this time approximately \$7500 have been loaned through this bank. Of this sum \$2500 have been from the United States National, \$195 from the depositors and the remainder has been stock holders money. Advances are small and all of them are approved by a depositors committee and the circuit court.

Since Mr. Coppock has been assisting in the liquidation of the Butler Bros. Bank in Hood River he has been drawing \$300 from the department per month and this salary is apportioned according to the number of days worked at each bank. Under the present plan the Moro State Bank is being handled for a little over \$100 per month. In the discussion of liquidation costs it was stated that the Madras bank earned three times the cost of liquidation during the process.

In regard to the possibility of obtaining some money from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation Mr. Schram declared that at present the regulations of that organization were such that he did not consider it advisable to borrow money for the relief of depositors of closed banks.

The speaker recognized the fact that there always rumors about the conduct of banks after closing and warned that a man's judgment was no better than his information. It is possible to procure accurate and reliable information about the affairs of any closed bank either through the officials in charge or the circuit court.

D. E. Stephens, of Moro, J. P. Yates, of Wasco and A. A. Dunlap, of Kent were named on a committee to meet with the highway commission to advocate the rebuilding of the southern end of the Sherman Highway.
