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Cooked Wheat Good Eating

1 cup whole wheat cereal
 1 teaspoon salt
 4 cups water
 Bring water to boil, add salt, slowly add cup of cereal cook one hour in double boiler or for thirty minutes over a slow flame stirring frequently to prevent burning. A steamer fireless, or electric cooker can be used to good advantage in cooking wheat cereal.
 This amount makes four large servings. Serve with sugar and milk or cream.
 Since long cooking improves wheat cereals, any left over cereals can always be used in making other dishes or may be simply reheated and served again. To reheat, add enough water and milk to thin to the right consistency, then bring slowly to the boiling point.

BREAKFAST VARIATIONS
 1. Add to the cooked cereal fresh fruit such as bananas, berries or peaches.
 2. Add canned fruit or fruit juice sauces.
 3. Cook dried fruits, such as dates, raisins, figs, prunes or apricots, in

cereal.
 4. Add peanut butter or a few nut meats just as the cereal is finishing cooking.

5. Use milk instead of water in preparing the cereal.

6. Cook the cereal, then add two tablespoons of sugar and two beaten eggs, keep over low flame long enough to cook the eggs, stirring to prevent burning and serve as a breakfast food, like porridge.

7. Prepare as above adding cooked dried fruits such as raisins, prunes, apricots, dates or figs.

8. Vary the sweetening by using brown sugar, honey, preserves or jelly.

9. Serve with butter instead of milk or cream.

10. Cook the cereal the evening before, allow cold and fry for breakfast.
