**CANDIDATES**

Those who pay a great attention to parties may feel that the primary elections are of small consequence in that they merely serve to pick the representative of that party, but often times the most important choosing has to be done at the primaries. Several men whose reputations in governmental affairs or in private life seem to fit them especially for the position they seek.

One of these men is Senator Steiwer, who in his first term as senator from Oregon has done a great deal for his constituents and through his ability has won committee appointments that are the envy of much older men in the senate. Senator Steiwer, although his present residence is in Portland, is an eastern Oregon man which makes him especially valuable to wheat farmers as a representative. When organizations confer with him or write to him about their needs regarding such things as seed loans, summerfallow, freight rates or live stock conditions he knows what it is all about and is acquainted with the conditions without the lengthy explanations needed when soliciting the support of many other federal representatives.

A state office to be filled this year is that of secretary of state. Hal E. Hoss has been in that position for the past four years and during that time has so increased his former wide knowledge of the state and its needs that he is peculiarly fitted to continue in that capacity for another term.

The position of state treasurer has two contestants the veteran Rufus Holman, an appointee of Governor Meier and Milt Scherping, by reputation a snappy young business man and war veteran.

In our own legislative district former representative J. P. Yates is running for a seat in the senate, which position his experience as a representative makes him fitted to fill. His governmental experience has been wide having been connected with government, city, local and state for nearly twenty years.

Residents of Sherman county will not have direct representation in the state legislature unless Mr. Yates is elected senator and as he is the only candidate for the office who has had any legislative experience he should survive the May and November ordeals. His interest in freight rates and other farmer problems are such as to commend him to voters in this district.

In the race for representative Earl W. Snell of Arlington is the leading candidate as he has had three terms experience in the state house and will be a candidate for speaker in case he is re-elected. This probability makes him worthy of support by those who would like to see the district increase in prestige.

Our mild protest that Grass Valley was not surrounded by wild flowers has had some strange results. 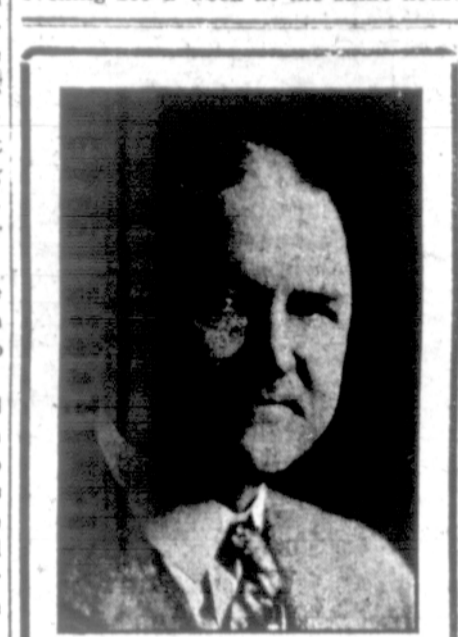

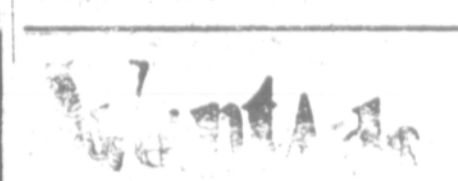
