CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS ANNOUNCED

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows: Director of Employment, \$4,600 a year, Indian Service at large, Department of the Interior.

Assistant Social Economist (Psychiatric), \$2,600 a year, Assistant Social Economist (Recreation), \$2,600 a year, Children's Bureau, Department of Labor, for duty at Chicago, Ill.

All states except Delaware, Iowa, Maryland, New Hampshire, Vermont, Virginia and the District of Columbia have received less than their share of appointments in the apportioned departmental service at Washington.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office of any city which has a post office of the first or second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

COOKING OF WHEAT

Cereals being good for breakfast, they are also good for other meals, in various forms. Here are some worthy of consideration:

1. Fried cereal is sufficient for the main starchy dish of any meal.
2. Add to left over cereal, an equal amount of ground, cooked, seasoned pork, hamburger, sausage or ham. Mold into cakes and fry.
3. Add to the above one beaten egg, bread crumbs moistened with tomato juice and mold into a loaf and bake.
4. Make a cereal custard pudding by using a thin custard thickened with cooked cereals. Good proportions are:

- 2 eggs
 - 2 cups of milk-scalded
 - 1-2 cup of sugar
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup cooked cereal
- Bake in slow oven until custard sets. Serve with cream or fruit sauce.
5. Cook one cup of cereal and add one cup of grated cheese. Cool, and fry. Peanut butter may be used instead of the cheese.
 6. Make a Spanish cereal as follows: Fry together diced bacon, onion, mango and pimiento, add left over cereal and simmer for a few minutes.

OTHER USES FOR WHOLE WHEAT

Whole wheat flour may be used in pancakes, muffins, waffles, shortbread and bread. One-third whole wheat and two-thirds white flour is a good proportion to use. If too much whole wheat is used the bread is heavy.

Left over cereals may be used to thicken soups. A cereal gruel, two tablespoons of whole wheat to a cup of water or milk—makes an excellent dish for aged people.
