Of the unopposed candidates G. C. Vinton for county clerk received 499, Wiley Knighten, for school superintendent received 500, George W. Wilcox, for coroner received 473, P. C. Axtell, for county commissioner, received 461. They are unopposed in the final election as well.

County Democratic nominations went to Roy Belashee for sheriff as he was not opposed within his party and to A. M. Young for county treasurer who received the Republican nomination as well through writing in by his Republican friends.

R. J. Ginn received the Republican nomination for justice of peace for the Moro precinct. Joseph A. Mee was accorded the same nomination for the Wasco district, R. P. Foister for Rufus and R. A. Stow was named for the same position in the Grass Valley district on the Democratic ticket.

Ray Wiseearver will oppose Hoss in November, having won the Democratic nomination, unopposed, Malony, former banker of Pendleton, will oppose Holman for treasurer and VanWinkle may be conceded the election for Attorney general as he has no Democratic opposition.

The vote in the non-partisan judicial election in Sherman county resulted in J. W. McCulloch winning the most votes for position No. 2 and J. O. Bailey running far ahead for the other place. The official vote gave Brand 34, Hewitt 83, McCulloch 341, and Bean 234. Graham received 107, Bailey 369 and Brown 167.
