RATE MEETING

He attended and E. M. Hulden, of Arlington another director, and W. S. Powell, of Moro also a director, spoke favoring the proposal of Mr. Collins that a committee be appointed to meet the railroad executives in Portland.

A. B. Robertson, manager of the Condon local and an old time grain and wool shipper spoke heatedly for a few minutes about railroads and the unfairness of their rates. J. P. Yates of Wasco, state representative and Republican nominee for the state senatorship, told farmers that lower rates could be had if they were demanded by all of the farmers and said that the railroads would lower their rates when they considered it necessary and not before.

On a motion by A. B. Robertson it was decided to send a committee made up of one man from each local in the Columbia basin wheat country to Portland on June 6th to meet with the railroad heads and explain to them the way of freight reductions on the wheat the wheat growers expected in coming crop.

An interesting short talk was made by Charles Stewart, secretary of the Farmers National and president of the West Central Grain Corporation, one of the large regional operating under the marketing act.

Mr. Stewart is on a trip to the northwest, and came up from Portland with Mr. Collins to be present at the meeting. He said that the farm cooperatives were not government agencies but were private agencies formed by farmers for the handling of their own produce. That they were permitted to borrow money from the government did not make them government agencies at all. They are merely borrowing government money when needed and they are paying it back with interest when due or before the due date.

He cited the case of one elevator company in Nebraska, his home state, that was owned by 300 farmers. In May 1930 they bought \$5000 worth of stock in the regional paying \$500 cash. That fall they paid up the remaining \$4500 and were issued an additional \$2400 worth of stock on their profits for that year. In 1931 they paid off \$32,000 worth of debts, had a surplus of \$33,000, declared a dividend of 7 per cent and paid farmers belonging to the company 2 and a half cents per bushel dividend on their wheat. And all of this profit, he declared, came out of profits that had hitherto gone to the grain handling companies.
