Camp Ringwaak Open Next Month
Special attention is paid the diet and preparation of the food for the Boy Scouts camping at Camp Ringwaak. The Scout Camp, which will open on July 17th. The menu for the entire camp has been prepared by an expert dietitian, with proper regard to

the value of green vegetables and fresh fruit for the growing boys. Donations of fruit and vegetables are always welcome and many friends of scouting have made possible the low cost of this camp by their help in this regard. The food is properly prepared by the camp chef, Mr. F. J. "Daddy" Doyle, himself a father and experienced cook. With the boy, food stands foremost in his opinion of a good time at camp, and this thought has been given full consideration by the camp staff. Parents with any special diet questions or problems are urged to write Scout Headquarters.

In keeping with the present times the cost of the Boy Scout Camp has been lowered to \$5.50 per week which should enable every scout in the nine counties of this area to attend Camp Ringwaak. Opening on July 17th, this camp will continue for four weeks. A boy may attend either one or the entire four weeks at a cost much below that of any other form of vacation. With the health giving sunshine, regular hours, daily swimming and other well arranged activities a scout camper will return home well fitted for his winter in the school room.
