Built to Fly in the Stratosphere



This is the F-1000-1, France's first stratosphere built by Henry Farman with support of the government, which was given its first test near Versailles recently in the presence of many aviation experts. The plane is designed to attain a speed up to 375 miles an hour flying at altitudes above 60,000 feet. It is chiefly distinguished from an ordinary monoplane by its great wingspread and by the air compressors attached to the fuselage enabling it to breathe compressed stratosphere air. It is hoped that a trip from Paris to New York may be made in less than 10 hours in the new plane.
