

DAIRY PRODUCTS ARE EASILY CONTAMINATED

Dairy products, while being the most carefully manufactured and inspected of all foods reaching the kitchen are among the most easily contaminated by contact with other foods. Extreme care should be taken to see that butter, cheese, milk, cream and cottage cheese are given the same sanitary care in the home that is given to the milk on the producing dairy and in the manufacturing and distributing plants. Some people do not realize that only a slight contamination from other food, thru direct contact or through odors, will often render dairy products unsavory and even entirely unsatisfactory for human use.

Butter is perhaps the most susceptible of all dairy products to "foreign" odors and tastes. One onion may contaminate a pound of butter, giving it a decided "wild onion" flavor. Often times complaints are made to creamery men that butter is being churned from cream produced by cattle which are eating wild onion tops in their forage. The fact that these complaints come in most often when cattle are not on pasture but when onions are a common part of the winter diet, indicates where the onion flavor comes from.

Watermelon and cantaloupe, ham, fish or any other highly flavored food product will also affect the taste of butter. Milk is likewise subject to "off" flavors if left in open vessels or with the cap left off the bottle. Cheese and cottage cheese also absorb various tastes if exposed to highly tainted atmospheres.

Butter makers recommend that only a liberal allowance for one meal be cut from a pound print and that the balance be returned to its carton or placed in a covered dish in a cool preferably iced, box or cupboard. Butter which has been exposed to the air for any long period should be used in cooking or shortening although only the highest quality butter can impart the desired true butter flavor.

Milk bottles should be placed under a full stream from the cold water faucet immediately upon being brought into the kitchen and when the milk is poured the cap should be returned to the bottle. By doing this much of the chance for odor contamination is removed.

Cheese will keep much longer and in much better condition if wrapped in oiled paper with the paper pressed close against the freshly cut sides. If there is a tendency to dry out rapidly a damp cloth may be wrapped about the cheese. Cottage should be kept in a closely fitted covered dish in a cool place.

Canadian Crop is Of Good Quality

Harvesting of the domestic spring wheat crop is now practically completed, but markets remained relatively small with growers slow sellers at prevailing low prices. The quality is generally good with protein averaging higher than last season. Cutting of spring wheat was practically completed in Manitoba, 40-60 per cent accomplished in Saskatchewan and 30-45 per cent finished in Alberta, according to the Manitoba Free Press. Threshing was about 60 per cent completed in Manitoba, 15-30 per cent in Saskatchewan and 10-20 per cent in Alberta. Conditions for the completion of the European

Summer suits of linen and pique have been adopted by the younger set with loud cries of joy.

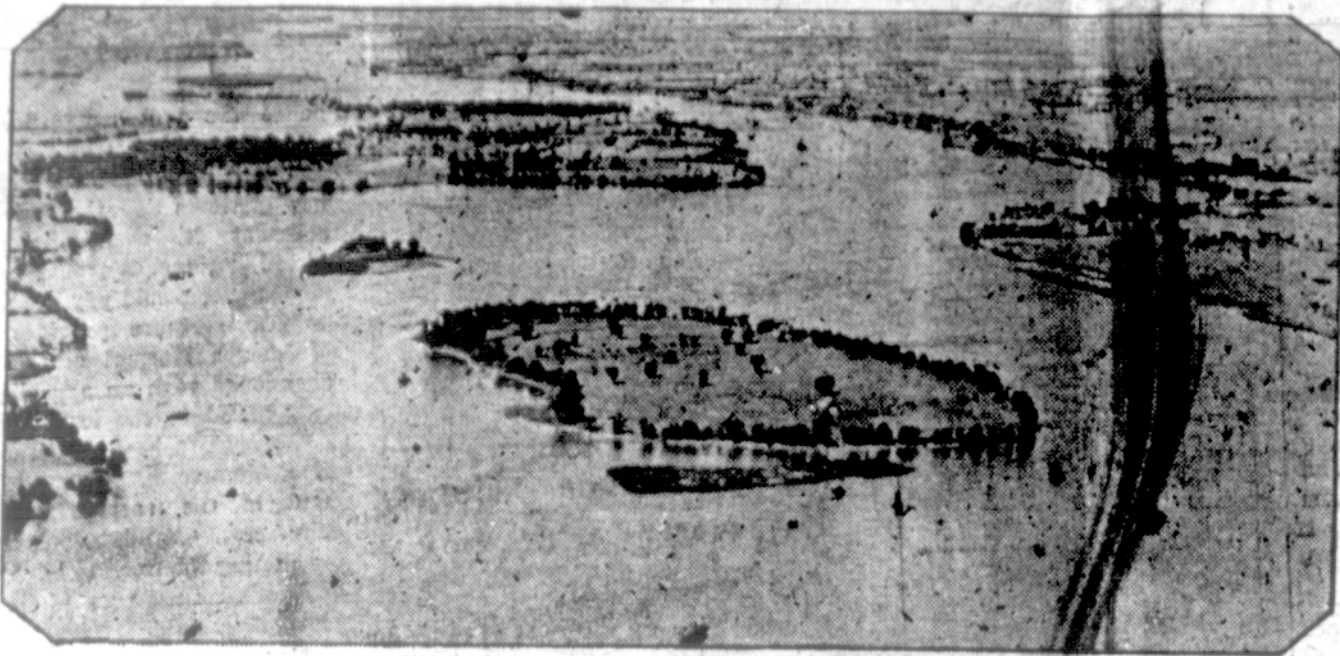
They are carefully tailored affairs, exhibiting the wide-shouldered, slim-waisted effect so important in the cloth suits of early spring.

harvests are favorable and indicate a harvest about equal to earlier expectations. The quality of the French crop is reported good and earlier offerings of new German wheat also show excellent quality. Some rust damage has occurred to Italian wheat and offerings of the new Rumanian wheat are reported of very low quality with test weights ranging from 55 to 55½ pounds. Early offerings of Russian wheat are reported to be equal in quality to those of last season. Prospects for the new Southern Hemisphere crops are becoming more prominent in the world supply situation. The 1932 Argentine acreage is placed at 19,250,000 acres, against 17,295,000 acres a year ago. The Australian acreage has also been increased, with early unofficial advices indicating an increase of 1,000,000 acres over that of last season which is placed at 1,990,000 acres. The condition of the growing crop was generally favorable in Argentina, Western and Southern Australia and Victoria. The condition in New South Wales is less favorable as a result of insufficient moisture. Crops in both New South Wales and Victoria have deteriorated recently as a result of dryness.
