Tax League Opposes

James E. Burdett, of McMinnville,
President of the Oregon Tax Equal-
ization and Conservation League,
which was organized at the request of
Governor Meier to combat high taxes,
today issued a statement condemning
the Zorn-Macpherson School Moving
bill as "one of the most extravagant
programs ever foisted upon the peo-
ple of the state of Oregon."

Burdett, who is one of the most
active workers for tax reduction in
the state and author of the plan that
has given Oregon Tax Reduction
Leagues in all of Oregon's major
counties today asserted that "there
is undoubtedly some selfish motive
behind the bill" and that the organ-
izations publicly supporting it are
not the bill's real sponsors and "never
furnished any material part of the
finances" that have been used in an
attempt to put the bill across. His
statement follows:

"Personally I am for education, but
I am not for extravagance with it.
The people of the state of Oregon

own the campus and buildings at Eu-
gene, the campus and buildings at
Corvallis, likewise those at Mon-
mouth, Ashland and La Grande, and
there is no reason why these respec-
tive schools cannot be maintained as
economically at these points as they
could if united at one point. The dis-
tance between Eugene and Corvallis
is approximately forty miles, and
there is no reason why one man can-
not supervise these schools just as
economically upon the two campuses
as though they were both at the one
campus.

"If extravagances were practiced
in the past, and I have no doubt there
were some extravagances, it was the
fault of the Boards which preceded
the State Board of Higher Education,
and not the set up of the schools.
Personally I am of the opinion that
additional cuts can be made in the
operation of these schools without de-
stroying their efficiency in the least;
but these additional cuts can be made
by the State Board of Higher Edu-
cation without weakening or inter-
fering with the physical set up of
the schools.

"After our Governor had vetoed
\$500,000.00 of the \$1,781,000.00 ap-
propriation made in the last legisla-
ture, I was one of a group of citizens
that sponsored the referendum on the
remaining \$681,000.00 and the Board
of Higher Education have now con-
ceded that they can get along with-
out this appropriation.

"I therefore agree with the pre-
ponents of this bill, that the costs of
education have been too high. Per-
sonally, I believe that the Board of
Higher Education is beginning to
realize this fact and are gradually
taking steps to rectify the error, and
if let alone they will effect enormous
savings in the administrations of
these institutions.

"Let us get together on a sane
progressive policy of economy, but
in our mad fight for economical ad-
ministration, let us not destroy that
which it has taken years to build. Let
us use common sense in all things.
It would be a mistake to destroy the
University, also the City of Eugene
and the Town of Monmouth, and I
feel sure that if we will act sanely
in this matter that we will prosper
by it.
