**HAL HOSS SLASHES GOVERNMENT COSTS**

The slashing of operating costs by a total of \$180,000 during the current biennium has been an accomplishment of the secretary of state's office, according to the biennial report being prepared this week by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, for the January legislative assembly.

"Savings resulting from this retrenchment program will revert in part to the general fund to help reduce the state deficit, while the balance will go to the state highway fund and to the counties that participate in the automobile license funds. The current savings are part of my economy program that was instituted in 1928," pointed out Secretary Hoss.

"The biennial report shows budget estimate reductions in the general

office, maintenance of capitol buildings, reductions in the motor vehicle department, and features the low operating expense of the gasoline tax department, which is less than any other state in the Union with similar laws. Bills for hotels and meals for employees of my department were less than any other state official.

"All of the employees of the department of state, including myself, have taken salary cuts as recommended last spring," Hoss declared.

Republican of Wasco, won the favor of more voters than did his Democratic adversary, W. F. Jackson of Moro but the race was very close in some precincts.

Earl Snell and J. O. Turner, unopposed for representative, were of course elected although Snell had much the larger vote.

From the vote cast here Tuesday it is evident that the voters of this county favor the amendment making it necessary for voters on taxation measures to qualify as taxpayers. The vote was quite decisive.

On the amendment authorizing criminal trials without the aid of a jury the voters expressed themselves as favorable by the following vote:

Trials without juries  
For 553  
Against 352

Evidently the voters did not understand the amendment to change the six percent limitation for the vote was very close. It is believed that this law, if enacted, would have tended to reduce taxes, but there was evidently doubt in the minds of many voters on this question as is expressed by the figures—

For six percent limitation change  
For 433  
Against 346

There was little doubt, however, on the Oleomargarine tax measure for the wheat farmers and their townsmen and women voted rather decisively to tax the substitute spread.

For Oleo tax  
Against 349

The commercial fisherman along the mouth of the Rogue river can still cast their nets and seine the salmon that enter the river if the people of Sherman county have anything to say about it for almost every precinct voted to back the commercial fisherman instead of the sportsman.

For prohibition of commercial fishing  
For 293  
Against 550

While most of the precincts voted close on the bill to repeal the state prohibition law there were some that voted overwhelmingly for it and others that were as decisive the other way. The net result was very nearly a tie vote and the lead switched back and forth several times during the counting.

For repeal 511  
Against 498

The freight truck and bus bill found favor in two of the towns of the county but generally the county was against it.

For freight bill 417  
Against 594

The proposal to move the University of Oregon over to Corvallis and make other adjustments in the educational system of the state found no favor among Sherman county voters, who were apparently not moved by the plea of economy put forward by advocates of the bill. It found generous and overwhelming defeat in this county.

To move university 116  
To not move 905

Higher education appropriation  
For 115

Against 774  
The bill and amendment to authorize control over the taxing units of the counties were both defeated in this county, as apparently voters felt able to handle their own taxation problems.

The votes were:  
For Amendment 258  
Against 470  
For Supervising bill 319  
Against 437

Some precincts believed that the increase of income tax would not be favorable to them while others, apparently reckless as to what might happen to a merely hypothetical income, voted to allow the increase from five to eight percent.

Voters in Sherman county were in favor of pledging the assets of the county and state if need be for the development of electric power according to their vote on the last measure on the ballot.

**Vote in Gilliam and Wheeler Counties**

The vote in Gilliam and Wheeler counties for Circuit Judge was as follows. Gilliam, Parker, 813; Hendricks, 534. Wheeler, Parker, 267; Hendricks, 973. This makes a total vote of 2100 for Hendricks, 1419 for Parker.

For state senator Jackson won Gilliam county by 108 votes and lost Wheeler county to Yates by the same number. This gives Yates a majority of 108 votes, exactly the same number as he won Sherman county.
