Results of the experiment station varietal trials and cooperative nurseries will be available through D. E. Stephens of Moro who will tell of several new varieties and some standard ones showing promise in some special localities.

Beer and its effect on the barley acreage will be considered by this committee in determining whether the foam-producing cereal should replace wheat to the extent prevailing in pre-prohibition days. Malting varieties, proper soil conditions, harvest and threshing methods and grades for the crop will also require committee consideration.

With John Withycombe of Arlington as chairman and W. W. Lawrence of The Dalles as secretary of the transportation committee will bring recommendations regarding Columbia river development and convenient truck transportation. Mac Hoke of Pendleton and A. B. Robertson of the Portland office as well as others close to the Agricultural Reconstruction Finance corporation will be on hand to help in clarifying the use of these new finance channels. Eastern Oregon's acute banking situation will pep up the work of this committee. The local representatives have been badly handicapped by delays in Washington, D. C., which have made wheat loans difficult and hard to make. The non-partisan board apparently cannot be blasted into action by political pressure so opportunity to eliminate some bureaucratic red tape will not be over looked at this session.

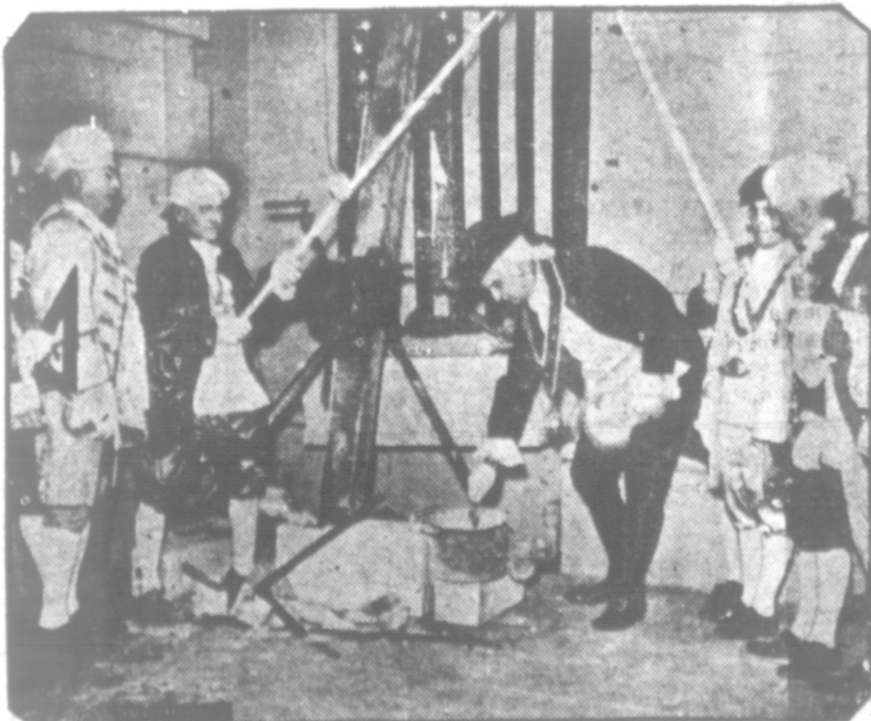
