for a unit valuation of \$23.39. We have more cattle in the county this year and they are worth more money in total though not unit value. In 1931 there were 3279 cattle and this year the assessor found 3986. The unit value was \$23.86 last year and is now \$20.15.

Sheep and hogs are the animals that have fallen from grace from the value standpoint, however. In 1931 a sheep was listed as being worth \$3.57 and in 1932 is only called worth \$2.25. Hogs that last year were assessed at \$9.69 are now put on the books at a mere \$3.87.

Total valuations of all property in the county under the jurisdiction of the county assessor is given as \$8,128,800, a drop of over \$260,000 since last year and a drop of \$2,500 since 1928.

This does not include the valuations of the public service companies as they are valued by the state tax commission. Last year they were assessed at \$3,251,756 in this county and it is probable that their valuation will remain much the same for this year.

The budget committee of the city met last Monday night and drafted the budget for next year. The next meeting will be December 9.

Continued from page one. estimated at \$3600 which is a drop of \$400 from last year, but the rates have been cut during this year. The total receipts for seven months under the old rate and five months of the new rates have been \$3714.

The hearing will be held late in December.

Wasco is voting a budget which includes estimated expenditures of \$8168 and receipts of \$3168 making it necessary for them to raise an even \$5000 by taxation. This budget also allows for the payment of some of the bonds owed by the city and the interest on their total indebtedness. Wasco's indebtedness is \$47,000.

They are allowing the same salaries for the recorder and the treasurer but are cutting the marshal's salary to \$1200.

Earl T. Jones has resigned as treasurer of Wasco and his place will be filled by appointment by the council until the first of the year when Mrs. B. Estrella Hailey will take office having been elected at the November election.
