### Oldest Spot in Oregon Found By Professor

Anyone desiring to stand on the oldest spot, geologically speaking, in north central Oregon may be assured of doing so by proceeding about 12 miles southeast of Madras almost to the Jefferson county line where he will find several hundred acres that science has determined to be a mere 150 million years old.

This bit of information was gleaned from much of a great deal more economic importance contained in the recent published geologic map of North Central Oregon by Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, professor of geology at Oregon State college, which has just been printed and distributed from the press at the University of Oregon where Dr. Hodge was located while gathering material for the map.

The completed map covers the territory roughly bounded by the Columbia river on the north, the Cascades on the west, the city of Bend on the south, and the eastern boundaries of Jefferson and Gilliam counties on the east. The map represents an investigation sponsored by private enterprise and assisted by the National Research Council, requiring several years to complete. It is the largest piece of geological mapping in the state of Oregon and covers the area which is considered the key to any future detailed mapping of this state.

The purpose of a geological map, according to Dr. Hodge, is to show the kind, distribution and position of the rocks of a given area. The rocks, according to their age, composition, association and position are divided into formations. A study of the factors is fundamental, he explains, to a full understanding of the geological history and even the economic possibilities of a region. Dr. Hodge is now engaged in writing a report covering these matters in detail and based on his investigations.

The map is drawn to large enough scale so that any point of interest can easily be located on it. It is printed in colors marking the various geologic formations and has other marks indicating structure. It is accompanied by a supplemental bulletin descriptive of the area.

The map is not available for free distribution but some extra copies are available at a slight cost.

### Wheat Of The World Reported Fair

**WHEAT:** New crop prospects were an important factor in the wheat market during the week. Large areas in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado were particularly in need of moisture and the crop deteriorated during the week in many sections. The condition of winter wheat in the western third of Kansas was reported at only 36 per cent normal, with some counties as low as 15 per cent. An average condition of 65 per cent is reported for Central Kansas. In Europe, dry weather prevailed in many parts of

the Balkans, and germination is irregular. Seeding made satisfactory progress in Germany and about the same acreage as last season has been seeded in France. Russian seedings at the close of November were 5,000,000 acres less than last season, with the largest decrease in winter areas. Droughty conditions continue in Southern sections of the country. Rains were beneficial to new wheat in Northern African countries, but more moisture is needed to insure satisfactory germination. Moisture is reported insufficient in the Indian Punjab. Rains were received in Argentine wheat regions but were mostly too late to be helpful to the crop and irregular yields are reported in the Western, Southern and North Central areas. Present indications are for a smaller crop than was expected earlier in the season.

The disturbed situation in the wheat market this season is reflected in the smallest world movement in recent years. World shipments of wheat, including flour, during the four months period August through November, totaled around 195,000,000 bushels compared with 275,000,000 bushels for the corresponding period last year. The bulk of these shipments, as is usual in the fall months, was from North America. United States and Canadian overseas shipments during the period totaled about 127,000,000 bushels as against 125,000,000 bushels last fall. Argentine exports since the first of August have totaled around 14,000,000 bushels compared with 26,000,000 bushels last season and Australian shipments about 29,000,000 bushels as against 32,000,000 bushels through November last year. The short wheat crop in the Danubian countries is reflected in very light exports, which have totaled less than 2,000,000 bushels whereas last season from August 1 through November over 25,000,000 bushels were exported. An export bounty, which is not now effective, stimulated shipments last year. Russian shipments this fall have been only about one-fifth as large as last season and have totaled slightly less than 1,000,000 bushels.
