river for power and transportation and recommended an increased fee from large trucks of approximately \$600,000 per year.

The Taxation and Legislation committee with Mac Hoke as chairman, has been holding meetings since early in the summer and it had several suggestions to make to the incoming legislature. This committee protested strongly against the imposition of a property tax again this year. Statistics regarding the delinquencies in taxes in the wheat counties were read and the committee members contended that the collection of the direct property tax would bankrupt these counties. It was voted to advocate a sales tax if additional taxes were necessary.

Several means of reducing taxes were suggested among them being the county unit plan of county schools, consolidation of county offices and road districts and some plan of tax supervision. The committee advocated the taxing of municipally owned public utilities and asked for a study of the county manager system.

Their plan for the lowering of highway costs included a reduction of not more than 50 per cent in license fees, an additional cent on gasoline with 60 percent of the revenue thus derived returning to the counties.

A request for the passage of an other income tax was also made by this committee.

The committee on Wheat Handling Warehousing and Production asked for several changes in the method of testing and grading grain. Among these were recommendations for protein tests, new grades for white wheat and distinction between brewing and feed barley. They asked that the discounts be placed on a percentage basis instead of the present system that was called especially disadvantageous with cheap wheat.

Speakers included Leslie M. Scott who gave a resume of the effects different sized cuts in the highway revenue would cause. Mr. Scott's talk was not a plea for continued highway expenditures but was more in the manner of information about the results that would ensue in case of any of a variety of price levels for licenses. C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, gave a synopsis of the county unit plan of school management and stated that it had worked satisfactorily in the counties where it had been tried.

George Hyslop and D. E. Stephens talked on matters of the production and grading of wheat. Charles V. Galloway, of the state tax commission, spoke saying that it was mandatory on the commission to impose the property tax but that it might not be collected if sufficient revenue were made possible by action of the legislature.

Earl Snell, speaker of the next house, gave it as his opinion that economy would be the watch word of the next session of the state legislature and stated that many economies were possible.

Dean Schoenfeld, director of extension work at Oregon State College, Walter M. Pierce, representative elect, A. R. Shumway, president of the North-Pacific Grain Growers, A. B. Robertson, representative of the Agricultural Credit corporation and J. W. Shepard, of Grass Valley were other speakers on the program.

Officers elected for the year 1933 were C. F. Emerson, president, of The Dalles, J. B. Adams of Moro, vice-president, and C. W. Smith of Heppner, secretary.

educational meetings scheduled by The Dalles-Wasco County chamber of commerce for the purpose of informing the people of the mid-Columbia on the proposed plans of developing the Columbia river.

The meeting held Monday night at the civic auditorium in The Dalles, was addressed by three members of a committee of seven appointed last spring by the Portland section of the American Society of Civil Engineers to study the report and recommendations of the United States Army engineers. These men, John W. Cunningham, J. C. Stevens and John H. Lewis, discussed various phases of plans for developing the power and navigational resources of the Columbia, following a brief history of activities of the past several years by W. S. Nelson, manager of The Dalles chamber.

Mr. Galloway, who gave a summing up talk, prefaced his address with a chiding of The Dalles folk for their lethargy in regard to the Columbia river asset. He cited that people of Portland and other outside points are

displaying keener interest in the Columbia than The Dalles folk, who, because of their strategic position are due to benefit more than those of any other section. Mr. Galloway pointed out the comment that Franklin D. Roosevelt, president elect, has made on the Columbia, declaring in his Portland address last October that development of the Columbia is the next of the great American waterways. He told of a letter that the President Elect wrote last April, wherein he declared himself in favor of all power projects of the nation that will be of a self liquidating nature. Mr. Galloway emphasized the point that the funds appropriated by the federal government in constructing dams on the Columbia will be repaid through sale of power. He cited that the cost of a single major battle ship, including building, manning and maintenance during its average life of 20 years reaches \$250,000,000.

"Let us forego one battle ship," said Mr. Galloway, "and we will have nearly enough money to build the dams of the Columbia river."

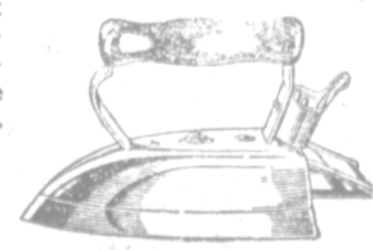
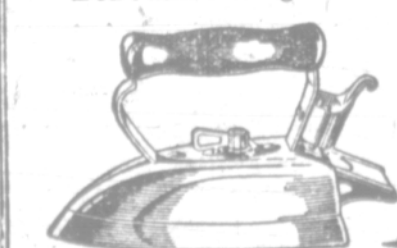
