Moro lost both games to Kent, on the Kent floor played Friday night.

POTATO PLAYS NEW PART

The potato has been called the one vegetable that can be successfully utilized in every course from soup to nuts. This reputation is a deserving one, for what other vegetable is used in such a variety of ways as the potato? The making of soups, salads, meat dishes, cakes, pies and bread are but a few of its possibilities.

The popularity of the potato is no doubt due to its mild flavor. For this reason too it is a good mixer and combines well with other foods. Food scientists have placed the potato high

in the list for nutritive value and since they are one of the cheapest and most filling of the starchy foods these are additional reasons for their popularity.

Potatoes, as do all starchy foods, combine excellently with dairy products. In fact, milk does more to make up for deficiencies in the potato than any other food. The use of butter and cheese with potatoes not only improves the flavor, but adds to the food value, as potatoes contain but little fat. In thinking of table use for the potato one usually thinks of baking, mashing, creaming, stuffing and frying, but these are not by any means the extent of their possibilities.

For an economical main dish, try escalloped potatoes with pork chops. It is made by paring and slicing raw potatoes enough to fill a baking dish. Put the potatoes in the dish in layers with bits of butter, pepper, salt, and a thin layer of cracker crumbs in between, until the dish is full. Pour over this sweet milk until it can be seen through the top layer. Bake slowly one hour, then place lean pork chops seasoned with salt and pepper on top, and bake another hour.

Another main dish is the combination of potatoes and eggs as given in the following recipe:

Oak Hill Potatoes
Four large boiled potatoes
Two cups thin white sauce
Six hard cooked eggs

Cut boiled potatoes and eggs into one fourth inch slices. Place a layer of potatoes in baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover with layer of egg, repeat, and pour over

all 2 cups of thin white sauce. Cover with cracker crumbs, and bake until the crumbs are brown. Proportions of white sauce are: 1 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon butter, one fourth teaspoon salt, and one eighth teaspoon pepper and 1 and one half cups milk.

A nutritious and easily made cake contains hot mashed potato. This recipe is excellent when used as cup cakes.

Potato Chocolate Cake

One cup hot mashed potato, 1 and one fourth cup sugar, one fourth cup butter, one fourth cup milk, yolks of two eggs, one fourth cup chopped walnuts, one fourth cup chopped raisins, one fourth cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon soda, 1 square melted chocolate, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, one half teaspoon cloves and one fourth teaspoon salt. Add sugar, eggs, butter and milk to

the hot potato. Sift all dry ingredients, and add to the first mixture. Mix well until smooth, then add nuts, raisins and chocolate. Bake in two layers, or bake as cup cakes. These cakes have the very excellent quality of coming out of the muffin pans easily.
