**Bankruptcy May Be Avoided**

Oregon farmers in serious financial difficulties may now avail themselves of the provisions of the new emergency bankrupt bill passed by Congress without the expense incident to the usual bankruptcy proceedings, according to an explanation of this legislation carried in the current agricultural situation and outlook circular issued by the Oregon State college extension service.

The law provides for the appointment by the federal district courts

ounts of claims approve the plan presented, a hearing will be held and if the court is satisfied that the plan is fair and practical it will be approved.

The current circular also contains new tables showing Oregon price indexes from 1910 to 1932 on 18 commodities and an index showing the general level of farm prices in Oregon over the same period. There is a trend toward the use of general farm price indexes in the adjustment of farm financial contracts to provide elasticity in payments according to ability to pay.

**POTATO-TREATMENT**

6. Tubers should be treated before cutting.

7. Twentyfive gallons of the solution is enough to treat 40 or 50 bushels of potatoes, after which the solution is likely to be too weak. It can be brought back to approximate original strength by adding one half pint of the stock solution and enough water to bring the solution back to 25 gallons. After 40 or 50 more bushels have been treated the solution should be discarded and a new one made.

8. Unless the tubers be planted immediately they must be spread out to dry. Do not store treated potatoes while they are wet. This is likely to injure them.

9. The diluted treating solution is not strong enough to injure the hand in ordinary practice. The strong acid should, however, be handled with care.

**How To Make Cookies And When To Eat 'Em**

Lucy A. Case, an extension specialist in nutrition, has written a series of recipes for cooking wheat and they have been published by the state college under the direction of Paul V. Maris. A copy has been sent to this office and other copies may be had from the college extension service.

For anyone who has hunger slip up on him three times each day it is an interesting booklet. It tells how to make bread, cookies, pudding, meat

loaf, stews and good sounding things without end. Now, for instance, suppose the man of the house was out of tobacco and had gone out and slammed the door, then left the gate open letting the pigs into the yard and he pigs had dug into the flower bed and pulled up the young lettuce before you discovered them. And suppose the calf got out and you had to chase it for half an hour and then put out a washing and then Johnnie came home from school with a big tear in his new overalls just when you were all tired out. Do you know what to do for that tired feeling that

follows such a series of events. Get down and eat three or four of these whole wheat cookies. Johnnie will be glad to have one too.

Three-quarter cup sifted flour, one-half teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon soda, 2 tablespoons fat, one-half cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup cooked wheat, 1 cup seedless raisins. Sift together all dry ingredients except the sugar, add the fat, sugar, beaten egg, wheat and raisins. Stir until well mixed. Drop by teaspoonfuls on to a greased pan about two inches apart and bake in a modern oven.
