

Repeal Election Candidates Backward

Nothing has been done about it here, but there is going to be an election on the 21st of next July. The voters are to be permitted to decide whether the old state of Oregon shall vote for repeal of the 18th amendment or for a continuation of the noble experiment.

Each county in the state is entitled to at least one delegate. There will be a total of 116 delegates at the convention which will be held some time in August. Those wishing to attend the convention as delegates must file with the secretary of state, paying a fee of \$5.00, and stating their position, whether wet or dry.

Voters will vote for either the wet candidate or the dry and the one having the largest vote will represent his county and vote according to the platform on which he was elected. So far there has been no campaign for this office from this county and for that matter, there have not been very many candidates from other counties either.

There is nothing partisan about the election. The candidates are merely wet or dry. It is only for the purpose of testing the actual desires of the people on this one question of aridity. Candidates will advance one pace forward. Sargeant, pick your detail.

Drunken Drivers Will Be Prosecuted

Reckless and drunken automobile drivers will be under closer scrutiny of state officials after June 9th, as a result of changes made by the state legislature in the operators' code, reports Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State.

Every person convicted of operating a motor vehicle because of incompetency, driving while intoxicated, recklessness and hit and run drivers, regardless of the court having jurisdiction in the matter, will be reported immediately to the Secretary of State for appropriate action in the matter of license suspensions or revocations, changes in the law require. These citations of traffic violations are required from all Oregon courts, which will include courts in every city and town. Previously only justice courts, district courts and circuit courts were required to forward the information.

The fact that each municipal judge or city recorder, is forced to make a report of all serious traffic violations upon which convictions have been recorded, will practically double the effectiveness of the curb on outlaw operators, explained Secretary Hoss. "Many serious traffic violations have come under the jurisdiction of these courts and the convicted drivers have continued to operate their automobiles because the State was unaware of the fact and could not suspend or revoke the operator's license. The new law will eliminate that condition," Hoss said.

An additional help to the enforcement of the suspension or revocation of drivers licenses is the new provision in the law requiring each convicting magistrate to immediately take up the license of those found guilty of serious offences and forward the cards to the state department.

Government Cos's Up Over 1930

According to the department of commerce, bureau of the census, the 48 states of the union increased their governmental expenditures in 1931 over 1930, but the raise was less than it has been for the last few years. The cost of government was \$11.40 in 1930 and \$11.75 in 1931. In 1917 the cost was \$4.19. One of the items that increased was interest charges that rose \$9,390,014 over the previous year.

For the operation and maintenance of general departments 40.9 was for education, 16.6 for roads and highways, 15.9 for charities, hospitals and prisons, 8.7 for general government, 5.8 for protection of persons and property, 5.2 for development, 2.5 for health and sanitation, 0.4 for recreation, and 3.9 for miscellaneous.
