

Domestic Wheat Crop Very Poor.

A domestic winter wheat crop of only 334,000,000 bushels this season was indicated by the April 1 condition of 59.4 per cent of normal. This would be the smallest production of winter wheat since 1904.

Spring wheat seeding was retarded by cool weather, sowing has just begun in Minnesota and Montana.

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ly four times as much wheat as last season was on farms in South Dakota, three times as much in North Dakota one and one-half times as much in Minnesota and six times last year's stocks in Montana.

Canadian stocks in Canada were officially placed at 312,819,000 bushels compared with 243,000,000 bushels a year earlier.
