**Motorists Are Getting Licenses Rapidly**

Nearly 500 thrifty motorists are obtaining renewals of their licenses ceived from Hal E. Hess, Secretary of State, and at this rate at least 112,000 persons are expected to have completed their registrations under the 50 cent fee during the four week period ending June 9.  
The cancellation of all operators licenses on September 1 that were issued between 1920 and July 1, 1931, and the subsequent renewal of all types of drivers licenses, each two years beginning on June 30, 1935, was decreed by the recent session of legislature. This means that all persons carrying original licenses, or duplicates of originals issued prior to July

**IDEAS FOR THE LUNCH BOX**

Variety in the packed box lunch, hether it be a school lunch or one carried by the grown-up is one of the important principles to follow. Such simple things as cutting the sandwiches in interesting shapes, surprise sandwiches fillings, a new milk drink, and occasionally a hot soup in the small thermos jug, are but a few of the ways to take the monotony out of box lunches.  
The noon lunch, no matter where eaten, should be planned to supply one third of the day's food requirements. The amount of energy spent in work or play must be supplied through the food we eat. The amount and quality of work done then in the afternoon will depend much on the kind and quantity of food eaten at the noon day meal.  
A well-planned lunch should include the protective foods, milk, fruits and vegetables as well as sandwiches which are usually the main part of the box lunch. Milk may be included as a beverage, in a soup or in puddings. Vegetables may be included in the sandwich filling or occasionally a raw carrot stick or celery will take care of this requirement. Fruit, fresh, dried or canned should be included. Cream or cottage cheese makes a good basis for sandwich fillings as they blend well with most anything and should be used interchangeable with eggs, meat or fish in some form. This pattern for a box lunch should be given to the variety and the

racking of the foods.  
A few sandwich spreads which hit the spot are:  
Sandwich Filling No. One.  
One half cup butter  
One cup cottage cheese  
One to two tablespoons thick cream  
One cup cooked, pitted prunes  
Cream the butter and spread on thin slices of bread. Spread cottage cheese mixed with the cream on half the slices of bread. Chip prunes, but do not rub through a sieve. Spread prunes on other half of slices, then lay together. Yield, eight sandwiches.  
Sandwich Filling No. Two  
One package cream cheese  
One cup dates  
One half cup finely chopped nuts  
Enough orange juice to give a spreading consistency  
Spread buttered slices of whole wheat bread with cream cheese. Chop dates fine and add other ingredients. Spread fruit-nut mixture over cheese and press slices firmly together. Yield 6 sandwiches.  
Sandwich Filling No. Three  
One cup salmon  
One hard cooked egg  
One-half cup finely chopped celery or lettuce  
Three tablespoons salad dressing  
Six leaves crisp lettuce  
Chop salmon fine, then add the other ingredients and mix to blend well. Spread on buttered slices of whole wheat bread. Place a leaf on lettuce in between. Yield, six sandwiches.

L. 1931, must obtain new cards before September 1st of this year. Under the new law, which becomes effective on June 9, these licenses will cost \$1, but under existing laws, this same license is selling for 50 cents and is valid for the same two periods.  
To obtain a renewal license before June 9, the applicant should first read the questions and answers that he is required to answer on a simple examination blank. These questions with their approved answers can be found in the Oregon Motorist's Manual, free copies of which are available at the county Sheriff's office, from newspapers, or by writing to Secretary Hess. To finally get the license, the applicant must see an examiner who will supply the necessary blanks and forms for the completion of the application.  
Motorists are cautioned not to send renewal fees by mail to the Secretary of State as this form of registration cannot be accepted until after June 9. Hundreds of such applications are being returned each day, costing both the applicant and the state extra postage.
