

Most Winter Wheat Looks Favorable

Winter wheat made favorable progress in eastern sections of the belt as a result of warmer weather. The conditions from fair to favorable in Tans-Mississippi states with the crop heading in Kansas and Missouri. Prospects are poor in Texas and Oklahoma and the crop is heading short. Harvesting is expected to start in early sections of Texas about the middle of June. Spring wheat seeding is practically completed in the north central states and much of the grain is up to good stands and color. Warmer weather with adequate moisture was favorable for growth. Spring wheat made good progress in the Intermountain States but low temperatures retarded growth in the Pacific Northwest. Rains and snow delayed seeding in parts of Canada but seeding was practically completed in Manitoba with about 95 percent of the acreage still to be sown in Saskatchewan and 25 percent

in Alberta. Wheat in earlier sown fields in Manitoba and Eastern Saskatchewan was up and showing healthy stands and color.

European crop conditions continued generally favorable although dry weather caused deterioration in parts of France and Italy. Progress of the new crop in the Danube is satisfactory but the season is late. Growth in Austria and Czechoslovakia was stimulated by warmer weather. Conditions in Northwestern Europe were generally improved, with more seasonal weather, but prospects are somewhat under those of a year ago. Russian spring grain seedings have progressed rapidly and are well ahead of last season and also of seedings of the unusually large crop of 1930 but no estimate is yet available of the acreage seeded to spring wheat.

Continued from page one. If decrease in dairy cattle numbers is attempted, no reduction in forage acreage this year would be justified in this state, Washington officials have been told, because of the prospective shortage due to adverse weather conditions.

Butter Really Economical

When the problem of buying the most economical food fat confronts the housewife, it is well to know that food authorities agree in favor of butter. From the point of flavor we all know that butter is unequalled. When used to spread on bread, toast, muffins, wheat cakes and all other good things which are served, butter makes the flavor a distinctive one. The secret of Southern cookery, famous since colonial days, lies in the liberal use of butter.

Not only is the use of butter an economy because of its delicious flavor, but because of its unique growth-promoting power. No other food fat contains Vitamin A, the growth vitamin, in such abundance as does butter fat. It is the most practical year-round source of this vitamin and furnishes the best and most economical reserve supply of it when eaten regularly.

There are still other reasons for choosing butter as the most economical food fat for the whole family. It is rich in Vitamin D, which builds strong bones and teeth and good muscle. Aside from these things, butter is an excellent fund of energy and is easily digested. Butter should be used generously then, as it plays a very important part in determining the well-being of the family.

The following recipes are delicious

because they use a generous amount of butter.

Baked Onions and Carrots

Cut washed and scraped carrots lengthwise. Place in a deep baking dish with whole medium sized onions which have been washed and peeled. Season with salt and pepper. Add one half cup water and one fourth cup of butter for each quart of vegetables and bake in a modern oven until tender.

Asparagus in Lemon Rings

Arrange boiled asparagus stalks through rings (one third inch wide) cut from peel of lemon. Place on oblong pieces of buttered toast. Brush lemon ring and asparagus generously with melted butter. Place in oven to reheat asparagus and arrange on serving dish.

Ginger Bread

One-half cup of butter
One-half cup of sugar
One cup of molasses
One-half cup of sweet milk
Two eggs
Two cups flour
One level teaspoon soda
One tablespoon pulverized ginger
One teaspoon allspice

Cream butter with sugar, add molasses, sweet milk, eggs beaten light, flour, soda, ginger, and allspice. Bake in loaf pan; serve with whipped cream.
