

Wheat Allotments

Local newspapers throughout the wheat belt in Oregon and elsewhere are being looked to to play an important part in the application and administration of the wheat allotment plan, according to word received by the Oregon Extension service.

Growers are being asked by those in charge of putting the wheat plan into effect to prepare two important items of information to have ready in advance of their application to join the wheat benefit plan.

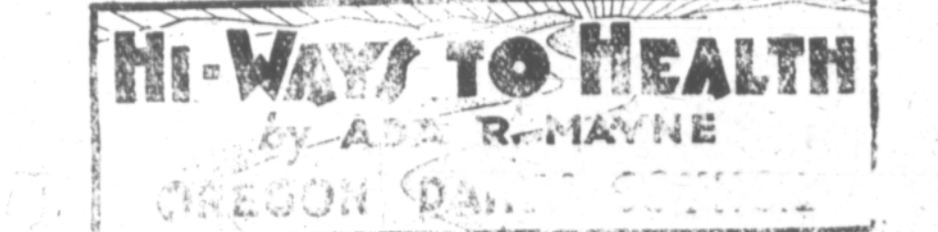

Fresh fruits, ice cream and milk sherbets are the ideal desserts for hot weather meals. For variety, a chilled pudding, an ice box cake or a frosty milk drink served with a cookie will make interesting summer dessert.

When we consider the desserts as an avenue for getting the protective foods, milk, fruit and eggs, into the day's diet, they become at once nutritious as well as satisfying. Since many dietary studies show that the average diet supplies too little of the essential minerals and vitamins, emphasis should be placed on including foods rich in these elements.

Some dessert recipes combining the fresh fruits now in season with milk and cream are:

- Raspberry Spanish Cream One and one-half tablespoons granulated gelatin One-half cup cold water One and one-half cup of scalding hot milk One teaspoon butter One-eighth teaspoon salt Two eggs, separated One half cup sugar One teaspoon flavoring One cup cream, whipped Two cups fresh raspberries Soak gelatin in water five minutes.

Beat egg yolks and sugar until light and thick. Pour hot milk over them slowly, stirring constantly. Add gelatin, butter and salt. Cook until mixture thickens (15 minutes) then strain, beat two minutes and then cool. Add vanilla, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and then whipped cream. When it begins to thicken add raspberries, turn into a mold and chill three hours.

Cherry Whip

One cup stoned black cherries One cup blanched almonds or other nuts One cup marshmallows cut in cubes One cup whipping cream Chill all the ingredients and mix with whipped cream just before serving. Grapes, raspberries, peaches, canned pineapple, or canned peaches can be used instead of cherries.

An appetizing frozen custard is made as follows:

- Frozen Honey Nut Custard One cup cream or milk One eighth teaspoon salt One cup boiling water One half cup honey One whole egg One egg yolk One egg white One-fourth cup chopped nuts Combine cream, whole egg, egg yolk and salt. Blend thoroughly. Combine honey and boiling water and bring to boil. Pour hot syrup over stiffly beaten egg white. Fold in the first mixture and the nuts and freeze.
