secretary of state's office a regular application form, having his signature sworn to and returning the application together with the \$1 license fee.

Forms may be secured directly from the main office in Salem, the branch offices in Portland, or from traveling examiners throughout the state who cover 61 towns on their regular schedule. Applications for operators' licenses may be acknowledged by county, circuit, district and federal district judges, notary publics, county clerks, justices of the peace, city recorders, clerks of district and federal courts and U. S. army officers when acting as officials for summary, special or general courts. This service is performed free of charge by the examiners from the department of state.

More than 40 per cent of the applications for renewals are received by mail through the main operators' division office in Salem and approximately 25 per cent come in from the traveling examiners. The remaining 35 per cent of the applicants make personal contact through the Salem or Portland offices.

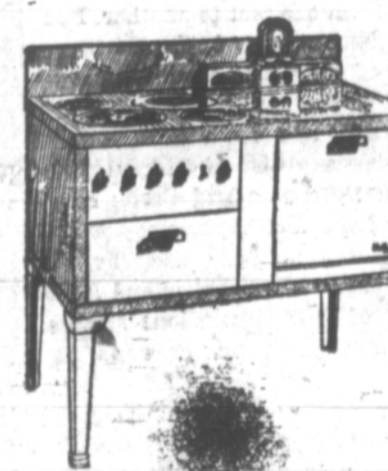
