 enough bread in the house for one person! Well, I was glad to see them any way and they set about finding something to eat while Rachel and I hunted up linen, etc. for the beds and rooms. By working quickly we got things half way in order and were able to go to Spencers before we met the train. (Charian rallied to the occasion wonderfully.) Bernie had quite a bit of shopping to do there and I had to get something for the folks to eat as the vegetables I had ordered would not come until the next day. Bernie and Mary entertained the two ladies while I got things moving in the house. The ladies were very tired and were glad to go to bed by 9:00 for which I was thankful. Bernie and I slept in one room and it being our only opportunity to say all the things we had to say we talked until past 2:00 a. m. Then the jackals came with mental pictures when I closed my eyes, then a rain storm came with plenty of noise and sleep did not come until about five which was not long before it was time to begin the new day. Bernie had to go to the bank the next morning so while the others were still resting we decided to walk there and take rickshaws back. It was time for breakfast when we got back and Mary and Bernie had to leave immediately after.

The two ladies, Mrs. Hayne and Mrs. Dean were very nice. Their husbands are tea planters in or near Coonoor. Mrs. Hayne knows Tamil exceptionally well and does a great deal of work among the Indians. She worked for a time at Amy Charnick's mission and they had just been visiting there before coming here. They left this morning. We went out on the back waters in a wallum last evening for a time which they enjoyed so much that they went out again early this morning by themselves.

Well, Baby Ginn is still finicky, I fear, after nearly three years of missionary life- I can fish a dozen puchies (insects) out of my soup and think nothing of it and an ant or two baked in the pudding doesn't spoil it but I don't enjoy the fellowship of cock roaches! Night before last I went to the supper table and the light made for or five of them scatter on the table to find shelter under dishes or in cracks. Charian tried to kill them but I moved my dishes into the office and had my soup there! The next day he gave the dining room a thorough going over and sprayed the table but another one greeted me when I went to supper last night.

I had a more imposing guest last night for supper however and have reason to thank the Lord for his protection from so many unrealized dangers. Before sitting down to the table I pushed the dining room door closed as a heavy breeze was blowing and I hadn't eaten many bites when I saw Inchie (the cat) attracted by something by the door. I drew the light nearer and saw something wriggling which looked very suspicious. I called Charian and tried to call Inchie away. It was a small poisonous snake which was on the inside of the door apparently crawling up when I closed the door and caught the fore part of its body in the crack just above the lower door hinge. As its head was on the outside it was quite a harmless plaything for Inchie! Charian killed it—it was pretty well crushed by the door but still full of wiggles. Charian that it to be a baby python but I don't believe they are poisonous, though all the Indians about the place say they are. We are on the look out now for its brothers and sisters as they are produced in whole ale quantities. Can't say as I was exactly hungry after that but by reading a paper I kept my mind occupied while the food was put in place.

Nothing very disturbing tonight, so I enjoyed my supper! Now will run along and enjoy a sleep. Hear Charian brandishing a broom in the kitchen—trying to kill a bat—I don't like them either in the house!
