LIQUOR

The report of the liquor commission appointed by Governor Meier brings to public attention again the puzzling question about how we are to conduct ourselves with potent spirits when they are made legal, as it seems they must be within a few weeks.

It is evident to anyone who reads the report that the members of the commission have studied the problem to the best of their ability and this conclusion is made more evident by the fact that they did not entirely agree. Had they considered the question lightly the report might have been unanimous.

It seems advisable to keep the sale of hard liquor under the control of the state or at least arrange to have it handled so that monetary profit is not so compelling a part of the business that it overcomes sound judgment. There are more dangers in drinking than there were before this modern machine age. Machines, whether automobiles or other powerful aids to industry, are to exacting to permit them to be handled by men intoxicated by drink. Some of the warmest supporters of the wet cause lead in insisting that liquor must be handled sensibly or discarded altogether.

One of the major contentions of the objectors to the report among the committee favored giving hotels permission to sell whiskey and brandy or other spirits of more than 14 percent alcohol as a means of stopping hotel room drinking. It may be presumed that men always have drunk in hotel rooms and probably they always will. Whether there is more incentive to overindulge in a room before dinner or at a table before dinner has not been decided and doesn't appear to be very important except to the hotel dining room proprietor.

Whatever laws are passed, it will be necessary for the people to observe them or they will fail. Drinkers and reformers have asked for hard liquor sold legally as a means of stopping some of the law-breaking and unsavory moral condition. Their plea has been answered and it is up to them to see that conditions are improved and that laws are obeyed.

SHALL WE HAVE WAR, OR PEACE?

The contention of Germany that it would soon be relegated to the position of a second class power unless permitted to arm has some substance of truth when the figures are consulted. From the report of the year-book of the League of Nations we find that the six large nations of the world other than Germany have increased expenditures for armaments 65 percent in 1930 over 1931 while Germany was forced to reduce 63 per cent. However, the notion that a nation must be armed to the limit to merit international consideration seems a little uncivilized.

Workers for peace will be discouraged over the events of the week end that caused Germany to leave the league and start a policy of rearmament. It will recall an old saying that war breeds war and peace begets peace. Surely, if Europe again becomes an armed camp some overt act will start another war.

It is said that the mobilization of men, the manufacture of munitions and the old trappings of battle will not be so important in the next war for gas and the aeroplane will devastate whole districts.

Whatever is to become of these pugnacious humans unless the advocates of peace become as aggressive as the war lords and the munition makers?
