Members of the Boy Scout executive committee are expected to meet next Wednesday evening to formulate plans for the winter's scout work.

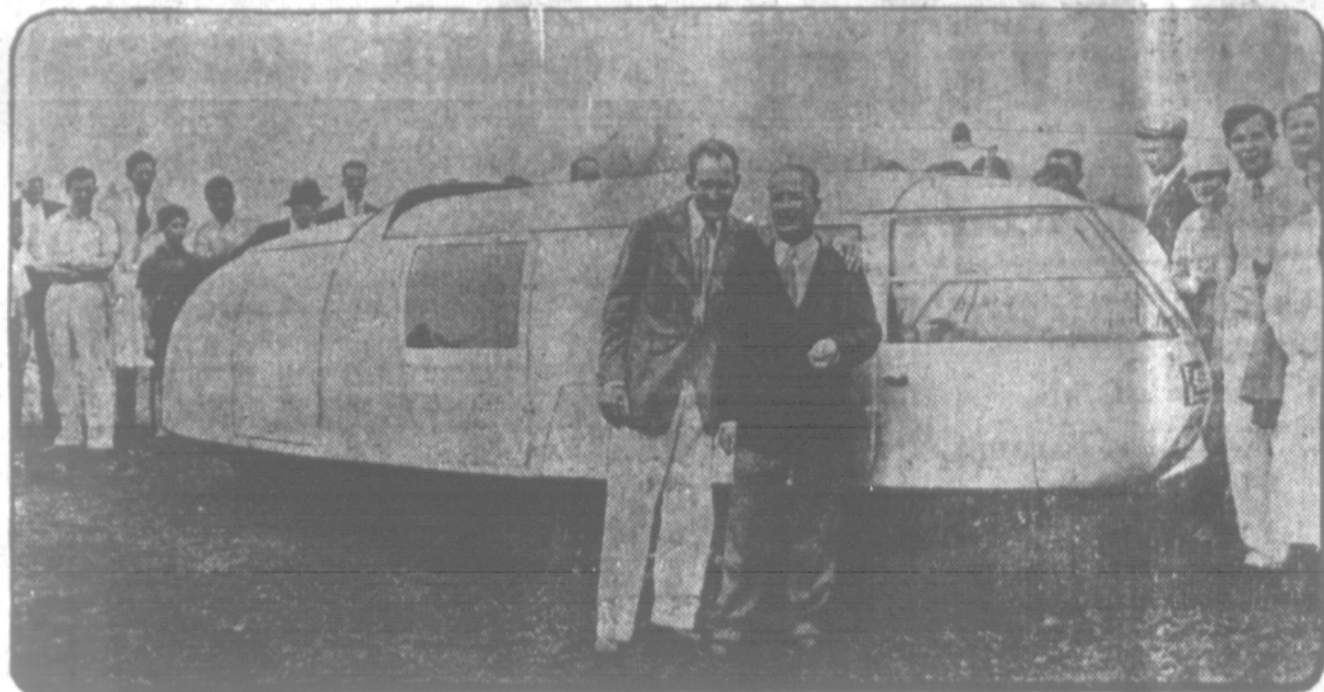
Mrs. Elva Bryant was in The Dalles Saturday to preside over the woman's club meeting of the fourth district of Oregon of which she is president.

The Wasco girls have again this year extended a kind invitation to the Moro girls and their mothers to attend the annual Girls Frolics, to be held October 28, in the Wasco high school auditorium. The Moro girls have accepted and will present two stunts.

A representative of the Portland Music Company was at school Friday, endeavoring to arouse interest in the organization of a school band. The students are interested and a number of them plan to take up this work.

The Moro volley ball team met with Wasco at Wasco, October 18. In the first half of the game Wasco's balls were well placed accounting for their lead at the half. The combined speed and excellent interference of the Goldendale foot ball team spelled the third defeat of the Moro Huskies.

The Moro ends were unable to turn the winners end runs inside and consequently they went for long gains and were the only consistent ground gaining plays for Goldendale.

Moro had several opportunities to score but tough breaks prevented. In the first quarter Belshes, Moro guard who with Axtell was the outstanding lineman for Moro recovered a fumbled Goldendale pass on the Goldendale thirty-five. The Goldendale team held for downs however, and soon afterwards drove down the field to score their first marker.

In the final quarter the Moro offense began to function properly, apparently for the first time of the season. Behind excellent blocking Barnes skirted right end for 40 yards. On the next play Thompson was stopped for gain but again Barnes shot around right end and it looked for a moment as if he would pass for 50 yards but the end after a run of about 25 yards. Fraser dove through

the line for three yards on the following play but the final whistle blew as the Huskies were in the huddle, preventing them from scoring.

According to the 1929 census Sherman county had land of greater value than that of any county in the north central district which comprises Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties. Sherman county's farm land was valued at nearly a million dollars above that of Wasco county its nearest competitor. Sherman county also led the district in the production of wheat seconded by Morrow county.

From the reports of the federal reserve banks: Somewhat less than the usual August-September increase in value of sales was reported by department stores. Sales were not equal in value to those of September, 1932, whereas in July and August, increases over the year-period had been reported. Wholesale trade did not expand by the full seasonal amount, but remained considerably larger in value than in the corresponding month of the preceding year. Seasonally adjusted indexes of freight carloadings, and intercoastal traffic, and automobile sales advanced moderately from August to September.
