Continued from page one. ing farmer's problems. All of the recommendations were passed by the league assembly although there was discussion of several of the resolutions. In all cases, however, the committee members had sufficient information and argument to carry their point.

Continued from page one. that it was probable that a trade war was imminent in the wheat business. He expressed confidence that the United States could emerge triumphant from such an encounter if the present export association was supported by the government as it should be.

A thorough explanation of the wheat situation of the world, especially of the northwest wheat conditions, was made by Harold Sanford. He sketched the production of wheat throughout the world, the exports and the consumption.

He prophesied that unless another short crop was harvested next year throughout the world the surplus would not be materially reduced. There is a probability that United States production will be ten percent less than the normal crop of 830,000,000 bushels which is about a hundred million bushels more than we use domestically.

In 1914 this country was almost on a domestic basis and the world war was the cause of the large increase in wheat production. Now it is probable that we will have to return to a production for domestic use only. An export subsidy and domestic allotment may be used to aid farmers while getting to that basis he said.

D. E. Stephens, of the experimental farm near Moro, told of the new developments in tillage and breeding of wheats. He especially warned farmers of the Columbia basin to beware of the dangers of erosion. When snow falls on frozen ground it is almost impossible to prevent washing and every care should be taken to handle land so as to prevent unnecessary washing of the top soil. He spoke of the new wheats developed, the crops available for contracted acreage, the soil conditions in regard to moisture and the lessons learned by the freeze of last December when only a few hardy wheats survived the cold. There has been as much moisture in the top three feet of the soil in the past four years of poor crops as usual. The deficiency has been in the lower three feet of usable soil, he said.

Shelby Wiggins, attorney from Portland, asked the wheat men to take an increased interest in the use of the river for transportation. He promised that freight savings would be more than can be immediately realized. It is not a question of competition between transportation methods as there is room in this country for all methods of transportation, he said.

J. O. Kincaid, of Lexington, director of a gasoline cooperative company told of the success of his company and the savings they are making in their fuel purchases.

Beginning the meeting were talks by Frank Emmerson, president of the leagues for 1933, who reviewed the success of the organization in the past year. The visitors were welcomed to the city by the mayor of the town and the response was made by E. M. Hulden, of Arlington, a director.
