Wheat Marketings
Lighter in Week

Unusually light marketings featured the wheat market during the first week of the new year. Only 1,373,000 bushels of wheat were received at the principal markets, with arrivals at Minneapolis the lowest in the history of that market. Diminishing farm stocks, uncertainty as to next season's supplies, the North Dakota embargo against wheat shipments, all contributed to the light movement. Wheat marketings this season to date as measured by primary receipts, have totaled only 128,000,000 bushels against 182,000,000 bushels for the corresponding period last year, reflecting the reduction of over 225,000,000 bushels compared with 171,000,000 bushels at the beginning of 1933. Domestic utilization apparently is somewhat smaller than in other recent years, with mill grindings nearly 15 percent below last season. Exports of wheat and flour have totaled only about 11,000,000 bushels against 27,000,000 bushels during the first six months of the 1932-33 crop year. Nearly 10,000,000 bushels of Pacific northwestern wheat however have been sold by the Emergency Export Association for export, with only about 6,000,000 bushels shipped out.

Market inquiry for wheat was not urgent during the first week in January, but with offerings light, prices gained slightly on practically all classes. Arrivals at the principal winter wheat markets totaled only 641 cars. Of these, 295 cars were received at Kansas City. The protein of the week's receipts at that market averaged 13.29 percent. Milling inquiry continued light but purchases by government relief agencies were a strengthening influence and premiums held firm.

A larger amount of money was placed in the different funds for poor relief, widows pensions, care of insane, etc. As it is necessary for the county to pay pensions to aged persons now and as there is more need of poor relief the sums were increased.
