

OREGON STATE NEWS ITEMS OF INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers

Moro—Wheat growers of Wasco and Sherman counties will receive this week nearly \$500,000 from Washington in allotment checks.

Brownsville—The North Santiam highway will follow the Santiam river for a distance of 67 miles, the distance between Mehama and Big Meadows.

Baker—The directors of the Baker Golf and Country Club have voted in favor of an application to the CWA for a grant of \$15,000 with which to improve the local golf course.

McMinnville—The city council of McMinnville has authorized formal application to the civil works administration for funds with which to construct the \$38,900 sewer project along Cosine creek.

St. Helens—Tentative plans for obtaining half a million game fish to be planted in Columbia county have been made by the St. Helens Rod & Gun club. Pheasant holding pens are also being considered.

Eugene—Eugene residents active in highway promotion have expressed approval of the action of the state highway commission in refusing to designate the proposed short road to the sea from Eugene.

Eugene—E. A. McCornack, state representative from Lane county, has announced his candidacy for the joint senatorship for Lane and Linn counties. He will seek the nomination in the Republican primary.

Ontario—Twenty-four applications for old age pensions have been acted upon by the Malheur county court. Pensions ranging from \$5 to \$20 per month, depending upon the income of the applicant, were allowed.

Albany—Mrs. Amelia Miller, a resident of Albany for 67 years, died Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. A. Leininger. She was 94 years old and a native of Germany.

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Corvallis—Plans for a co-operative oil company that shall serve the farmers of Linn and Benton counties have been formed by the Linn-Benton Pomona grange. Stock in the company will sell for \$10 a share.

Vale—A rollingpin contest staged by the Vale Meat company created much interest among Vale housewives. The target was a dummy man suspended in front of the store. First prize, \$1, was won by Mrs. Steve Gardner.

Madras—Two carloads of distillate have been shipped to England from the Lower Bridge distillate mines in Jefferson county. This is the first shipment ever made to England. Several shipments have been made to Glasgow, Scotland.

Merlin—Fire has destroyed one of the oldest landmarks in Josephine county. It was the Lindsay ranch house, one mile west of Merlin. Although known as the Lindsay ranch house for the past 18 years, it was formerly called the Brockman place.

Klamath Falls—The Southern Oregon Railroad company of Klamath Falls is preparing to make application for a PWA loan of \$132,500 for the construction of an 18-mile railroad from Dairy through Bonanza to a point near the Gerber reservoir.

Halsey—Ernest Nofsinger of Tangent has such a high load of baled hay on his truck that he could not pass under the Southern Pacific viaduct between Eugene and Goshen. He was placed under arrest by a state police officer for having a load higher than 11 feet.

Albany—Charles Evans, automobile body shop proprietor, received a conscience fund whose arrival was a complete surprise. Enclosed with a typewritten, unsigned note was a \$10 bill. "Some time ago you made a mistake in change and gave me too much money," the note stated. Evans has no recollection of the transaction.

Bridge Work Projected
Marshfield—Construction of five coast bridges, costing \$5,000,000 will be started not later than June 1, J. M. Deviers, attorney for the state highway commission, told the chamber of commerce here.

Bend Mill Seeks Federal Timber
Bend—Application has been made by the Brooks-Seaton Lumber company, one of the two big pine mills operating in Bend, to the Deschutes national forest for the purchase of 11,500,000 board feet of timber in the Sand spring country of the Deschutes district.

Sheep Deliberately Poisoned
Pendleton—Twelve sheep which died on the John Vey place near Echo ate poisoned salt. It was announced by the sheriff. At first the animals were believed to have eaten a poisonous shrub. When none of the shrubs could be found in the fields, a search disclosed a pile of salt beneath a bush. The salt had been sprinkled with poison.

The Hot School Lunch

A hot lunch every day will keep the school child growing, is the advice of the trained nutritionist interested in the health of the growing child, because of the benefits evidenced from the hot lunch program wherever carried out, the idea is rapidly spreading, throughout the rural, as well as city schools. Beside the actual needs of the child being satisfied, the school lunch when properly planned and supervised, can be the basis for teaching principles of good diet and forming good food habits useful all through life.

The hot lunch idea is carried out sometimes by supplying the whole lunch at school, sometimes by supplying just one hot dish and milk to supplement the lunch that is brought from home. Space and equipment at the school will, of course, determine this. The school lunch itself should be planned with reference to the means of serving each particular dish with the utmost sanitary precautions. The dishes served should be nourishing, easy to make, and those that can be prepared and served with the most simple equipment.

Cream soups and chowders are good because they are made with milk and thus are rich in food values. They can be made without elaborate equipment and served with just bowl, spoon, and paper napkin for each child. Bean soup, oatmeal and potato soup, mixed vegetable soup made with meat stock or with milk, cream soups of all kinds as tomato, split pea, spinach, corn, onion and celery are in this list. Fish chowder, vegetable chowder, corn chowder, and whole wheat chowder, also.

Other dishes which are almost a meal in themselves are Spanish rice, tomato rabbit, corn rabbit, or tomato corn and cheese, creamed canned salmon, creamed vegetables, or creamed mixtures of vegetables or vegetables and meat. These can be served on crackers instead of toast, and the cream sauce can always be made richer by adding grated cheese. Then there is creamed chipped beef, with boiled potatoes. If there is an oven available, escalloped dishes are good: for example, cabbage, spaghetti and

cheese; scalloped salmon; liver and whole wheat; liver and potatoes; shepherd's pie; or a casserole of mixed creamed vegetables with buttered bread crumbs on top.
