

OREGON STATE NEWS ITEMS OF INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers

Roseburg — Voting precincts in Douglas county have been reduced in number from 53 to 49 by the county court.

Seaside — Survey of the trail over Tillamook head has been completed by a CWA crew. The men are now at work grading the trail six feet wide.

Klamath Falls — Two years each in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Circuit Judge Duncan of Klamath county on William Reay and Delbert Griggs, confessed horse-thiefs.

Klamath Falls — Two important deals in potato land, involving about \$50,000, have been made at Klamath Falls. A flurry of interest in Klamath farm land, particularly potato acreage, is reported.

Halfway — Claude Officer, a stockman of Halfway, Baker county, is dead. Pneumonia was the cause of death. He was the first white child born in Pine valley and was 58 years old. In addition to his livestock, he owned approximately 3000 acres of land.

Eugene — Petitions are being signed by Eugene sportsmen asking the state game commission to close the tributaries of the McKenzie river below Blue river, and the tributaries of the South McKenzie, to trout fishing. For many years these smaller streams were closed, but were opened by the commission two years ago.

Plum Tree Blossoms — Wheeler — A 15-year-old plum tree on the August Grab farm near here is in full bloom, a month earlier than ever before. Daffodils are blooming in profusion. Scotch broom is blooming and grass equals that ordinarily found in meadows in April.

Supplementary Mill Added — Dallas — Erection of a supplementary sawmill here was announced by the Willamette Valley Lumber Co. The mill will handle logs smaller than considered economical for the larger plant and will have a capacity of 10,000 feet an hour. It will start operations about March 20.

Oak Tree in Full Leaf — Grants Pass — Puzzling local forest officials, a twig of oak, fully leaved, was brought to their office recently from Grants creek. The tree has remained in full leaf all winter. The foresters thought the twig might be a variety of evergreen oak, supposedly found only in southern California.

200 Ask Corn-Hog Contracts — Dallas — J. R. Beck, county agent, reports that nearly 200 corn-hog contracts have been applied for by Polk county farmers. These applications have reported producing an average of about 5500 hogs a year. From applications already turned in it is possible that Polk county may have more than its quota.

Big Shark Visits Bay — Rockaway — Coast guard members of Harview sighted a shark while cruising on Tillamook bay. They came close enough to it to graze its hide. They said it was 20 feet long and had a mouth large enough for a man to jump into. It was of the sand shark species, not dangerous to man. It preys upon the salmon and seal.

Pullets Lay Double-Yoke Eggs — Cottage Grove — M. G. Fry, living on the Mrs. Anna Burgess place at Saginaw, may have to plow under every fourth or fifth pullet if they don't show more respect for the NRA. It is unusual for pullets to lay large eggs, but these pullets, being limited as to number of eggs, have taken to chiselling by laying all double-yoked eggs that measure about seven inches in circumference each way.

Lime Plant To Start — Dallas — The Lime Sales Company, located five miles southwest of Dallas, began operations Monday morning. The plant is located on the old Oregon Lime Products company property and this company is affiliated with them at the present time. Since last fall, when the company took over the lease on the property, men have been at work installing machinery. It is an all-electric plant and from 12 to 18 men are employed. This is the only available deposit in the Willamette Valley which is capable of giving the farmers cheap lime.

Forest Grove — The Washington county court has agreed to establish as a county road the night road, near Dilley, leading from the Tualatin highway west, on condition that property owners pay a portion of the damage cost.

Redmond — Deschutes Netted Gems are pouring into Redmond for shipment to Portland and California. It is extremely heavy volume, with growers receiving \$1.50 to \$1.35 and bags. Most dealers are behind in their grading.

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

How An Adult Can Use One Quart Of Milk Daily.

For every child a quart of milk daily and a pint for adults has long been the advice of food scientists. Now we are told that positive health, vigor, and longer lives are dependent upon the use of even greater amounts by the adult and that nutritional needs of the adult are best served when a quart of milk or its equivalent in other dairy products is used daily.

The milk way to health is an easy road to travel for the average milk drinker who revels in his 4 glasses a day, taken with meals, or between meals, as he prefers.

It is convenient for another person to get part of his daily calcium need in the form of other milk products. He may take his quota in a glass with each meal, a one-half ounce of his favorite cheese eaten with crispy crackers and currant jelly to top off his lunch, and a serving of ice cream with dinner.

For the person who wishes to take more of his milk in a more concentrated form, he may use two glasses daily for drinking, or in cooked foods and choose ice cream for his luncheon dessert and one and one-half ounces of cheese with his dinner.

Part of the milk supply may be used in preparing foods. Cream soups, puddings, custards and milk drinks require milk to make them palatable. Cheese fits into the menu in souffles, foods au gratin, rarebits and easy to prepare desserts. Ice cream is a good buy because of its nutritive qualities and the infinite number of attractive ways it can be dressed up.

The following recipes help in supplying the daily quart of milk:

Corn and Cheese Souffle

Two cups corn
One tablespoon butter
Five tablespoons flour
Two cups milk
One teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
Two eggs
One half cup cheese
Scald milk and add flour blended with cold milk. Add beaten egg yolks, corn, grated cheese and seasonings. Fold in beaten whites. Bake in

buttered baking dish for 30 minutes, in a 300 deg. oven.

Prune Filled Custard

One and one-half cups milk
Two eggs
Three teaspoons sugar
One-fourth tsp. salt
One-half tsp. vanilla
Beat milk in top of double boiler. Beat eggs with sugar and salt. Add milk gradually to eggs, stirring constantly. Return mixture to double boiler and cook, stirring constantly until mixture coats spoon. Remove at once from double boiler. Add flavoring. Pour into sherbet glasses. Chill thoroughly. When ready to serve top with a generous tablespoon of Prune Filling made by blending thoroughly one-half cup chopped cooked prunes, three tablespoons sugar and one tablespoon lemon juice.

Sales Tax Sponsored

Portland, Oregon, (Special)—Declaring for a "new deal and a square one for every citizen and poverty tax payer in Oregon" Paul T. Shaw, head of Portland's School Board, today announced his acceptance of the chair-

manship of the School Relief and Property Tax Reduction League, and formation of a statewide committee of responsible citizens to support the new two year emergency 1 1/2 percent Sales Tax Law in the May primaries.

With almost half of Oregon's 2200 school districts on a warrant basis, property tax delinquencies up to 40 percent, and Oregon's farmers, home owners and general property owners facing a "tragic crisis," the time has come, said Shaw, "for the majority of citizens who pay no direct taxes, to unite for the relief of the tax paying minority."

The new law, he asserted, a "fair to every man," and cannot work hardship on the poor nor give the rich a chance to dodge taxes nor corporations to secure exemptions from any taxes they now pay. For the average man, he said, the tax would mean an expenditure of under 2 cents a day—something less than one third of the six cent tax that hundreds of thousands of Oregonians pay willingly every day for a "package of cigarettes." "Yet," he concluded, "such small contributions from the many will keep our 200,000 boys and girls in school, safe from the destructive irresponsibilities that can so easily attend enforced idleness."
