OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers

Eugene—Location of a \$200,000 malting plant at Eugene to utilize over 1,000,000 bushels of Lane county barley annually is being sought by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

Marshfield—John Walsh, who for the past several years has been district fire warden for the Coos Fire Patrol association, has been appointed to a post in the federal forest service.

Astoria—With only a few minor changes and the addition of one new teacher, the Astoria school district's staff will remain unchanged for the next school year. Salaries will be kept at the present low level.

Astoria—Despite a concession by fishermen to accept 6 cents a pound for August fish, there is apparently but little hope that a strike of Columbia fishermen can be avoided when the salmon season opens, May 1.

Bend—Konstantly Tokarzewski, a resident of Bend, has been fatally injured in an automobile accident south of Maupin. While going at high speed a front wheel of his car came off.

Bend—Three visitors to the Presbyterian conference at Bend last week lost all of their personal effects when their automobile was burned, while they were fishing, a short distance away.

Medford—A comprehensive clean-up campaign will be conducted by the city of Medford during May in order to make the city attractive as possible to visitors during the Diamond Jubilee celebration and also to create work.

Astoria—The city commission of Astoria has authorized the city manager to confer with the Port of Astoria in regard to a complete survey for use in efforts to bring about a compromise with the holders of defaulted city and port bonds.

St. Helens—All 35 of St. Helens teachers in the high school and grade schools have been re-elected by the board of directors and offered contracts covering nine months. Salaries are to be the same as those of the present school year.

Roseburg—Claims aggregating approximately \$22,000 will be presented by Douglas county and by the Roseburg school district to the state insurance commissioner in an effort to recover shortages in the accounts of former County Treasurer Sawyers.

Baker—Dr. J. H. Burchdorf of Baker has been elected president of the Eastern Oregon Dental society. Other officers elected are Dr. Eyer Young of Baker, secretary, and Dr. Frank Ames of La Grande, vice-president.

Eugene—The two schools of the Ten-Mile district, Lane county, are to be reopened because of a FERA fund advancement. New teachers must be obtained, as the former ones are not eligible under the rules of the FERA.

Newburg—The city council of Newburg has appointed a new park commission, of five members, who will have an enlarged responsibility in the administration of the city's parks under direct supervision of the council.

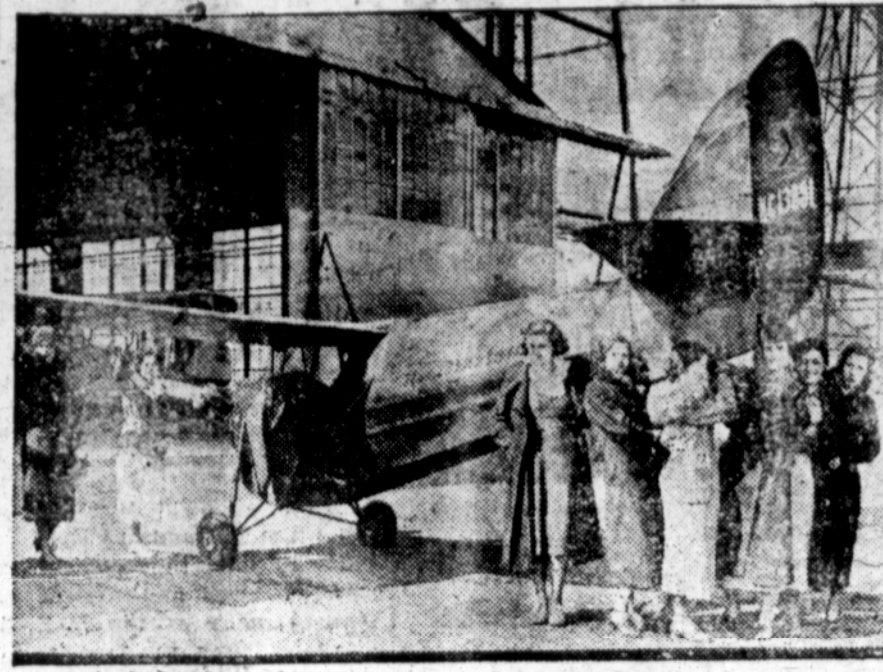
Hermiston—A large saving to taxpayers of Umatilla county has been made at the present term of circuit court. Many cases were either settled out of court or continued on the theory that they were to be dismissed later. No criminal cases were on the docket.

Salem—Apprehension is expressed at Salem at the growing tendency of members of the legislature to accept positions created by themselves, as in the case of John Cooper of Lincoln county, recently made secretary of the state rehabilitation commission.

HI-WAY TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE

It has been estimated through studies made of the health and food habits of children in our public schools that about twenty per cent are poorly nourished. This is due largely to the development of wrong health habits in the early years of the child's life before he goes to school.

Recognition of this fact is shown in the annual summer round-up clinics now held in most every section of the country. These clinics have for their purpose to check up on the health and habits of children who will enter school during the following year. After examination has been made by the physician and dentist, assistance is given as far as possible in the correction of any defects found, as enlarged tonsils, adenoids or decayed teeth.

Children have a better chance for health when attention is given from the first to the formation of good food habits. Simple wholesome food at regular hours in the early years will do more toward developing strong and healthy bodies than any amount of checking up in later life.

Every child should have the following foods every day: One quart of milk, to drink or properly combined with other necessary foods in the day's meals. Milk is the best source of lime. The hardness of bones and teeth is due largely to the amount of lime they contain. A large amount of lime is necessary during the growth period.

Some fresh vegetables, especially green, leafy-vegetables. Some fruit, cooked or fresh, as prunes, oranges, apples.

Three eggs Two and two-thirds cups milk Two cups flour Four tsp baking powder One tsp salt Six tbsp butter Beat yolks well; add milk and sifted dry ingredients quickly. Add melted butter. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites last. This recipe makes six large waffles.
