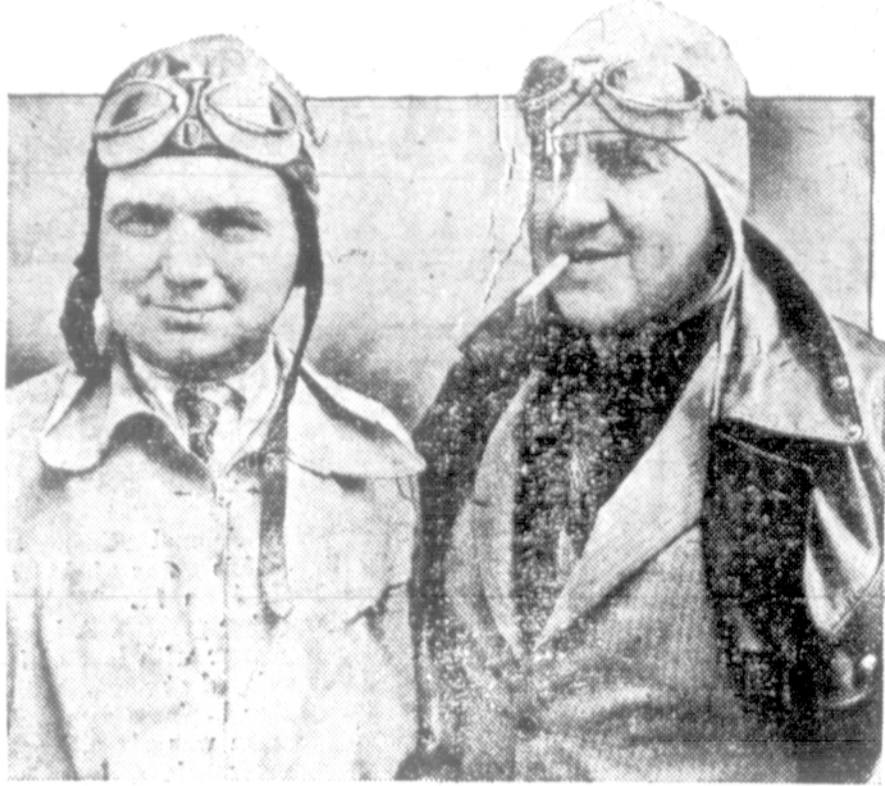

Bill Cody, son and grand son, drove to Portland Sunday remaining until Wednesday evening.

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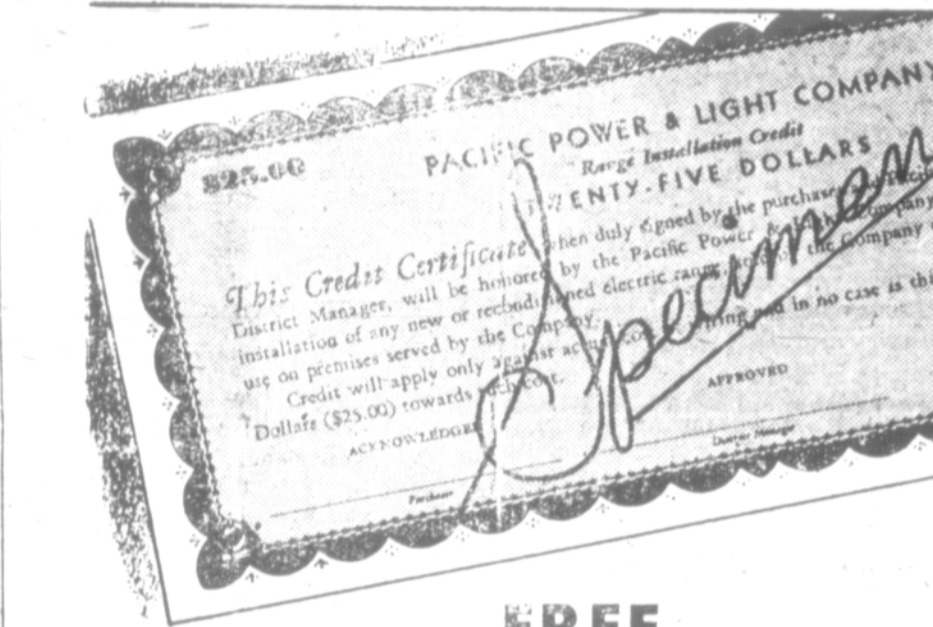


