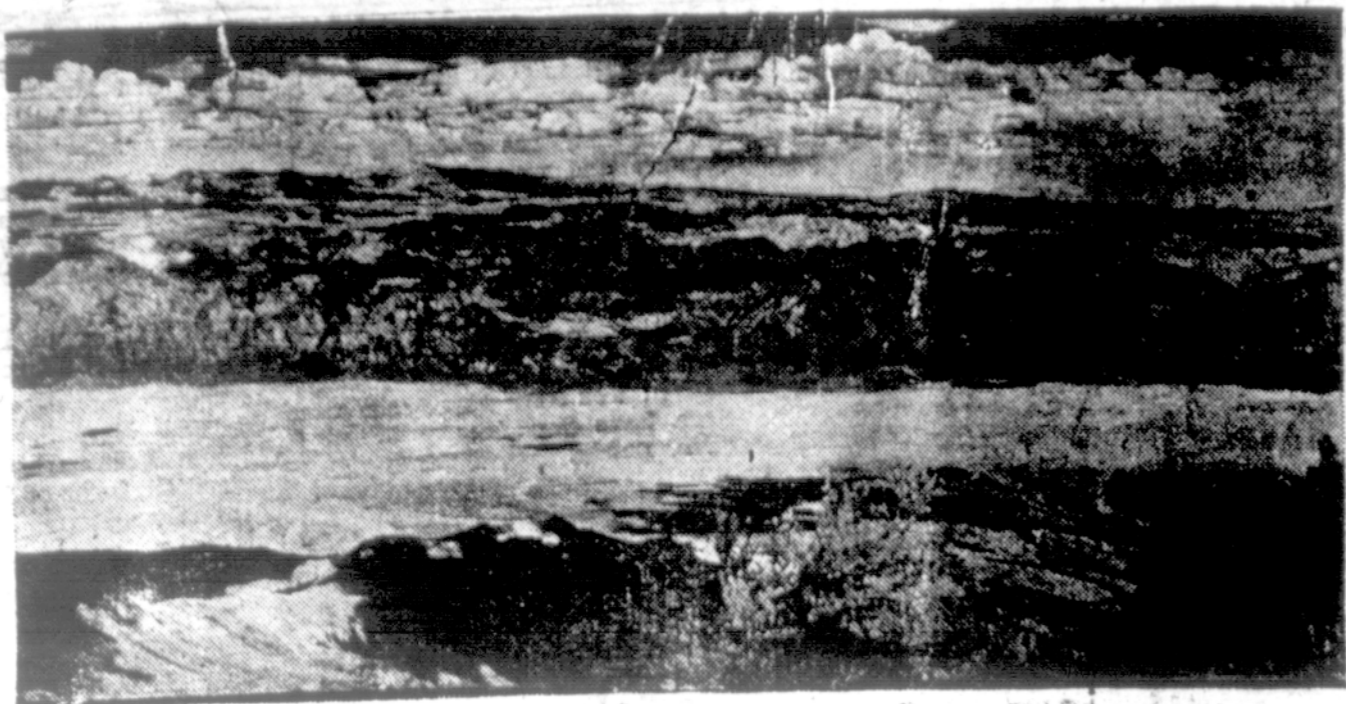


Death Valley Revealed by Infra Red Rays



The radically new method of photography, utilizing infra red rays and designed essentially for spectroscopic and research work, reveals Death Valley in California as it has never been seen by the human eye, revealing on the plate distant peaks invisible to the photographer. The picture was taken from the ridge of the peak looking toward Las Vegas, Nev. Death Valley appears in the foreground, 9,000 feet below and about ten miles away. The section of the valley shown is Bad Water, 285 feet below sea level, the lowest point in the United States. The mountains looming up on the far side of the valley are the Funeral range, while directly opposite is Dante's View, famous tourist mecca.

Work in the fields was held impossible by most farmers in this section Tuesday on account of the high wind that made hay pitching and harvest work out of the question.

Drouth Aids Prices

Some improvements in the general level of farm prices has resulted from the droughty conditions now involving nearly the entire central and western portions of the United States, according to a review of the agricultural situation just released by the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. Grain, hay, cotton and dairy products especially have increased in price because of the prospect for smaller supplies of these commodities. Well finished meat animals have also tended to increase price, says the report, but this is counter balanced by lower prices and heavy marketings of poor quality stock from droughty areas.

The sixteen north central and western states, in which small grains, hay pastures and ranges have been most seriously damaged contain about 46 per cent of the nation's hay and pasture-consuming animals and about 54 per cent of the hogs. From these states comes a large proportion of the total market supply of livestock. Normally much of the thin, unfinished stock arriving at markets are returned to the country for further grazing and finishing but recently, says the report, demand for these stockers and feeders has been greatly curtailed by shortage of hay and feed grains, both present and potential.

Fruit crop prospects cannot be accurately measured as yet, but according to the report, United States production does not seem

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likely to fall much below last year and not more than 10 per cent below average. The pear crop, estimated on June 1 at 21,425,000 bushels, is a little larger than the short crop of last year but about 5 per cent less than average. Although Oregon has an estimated crop of 2,470,000 bushels, which is about a million bushels less than average, the three Pacific coast states are expected to produce in excess of 15 million bushels, or about an average crop. Eastern have poor pear prospects.

Oregon, on June 1, had a condition of apples somewhat better than a year previous and about the same as the 10-year average, but prospects for the United States generally are much below average.

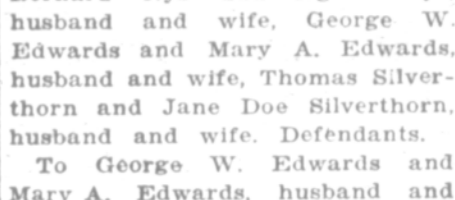
