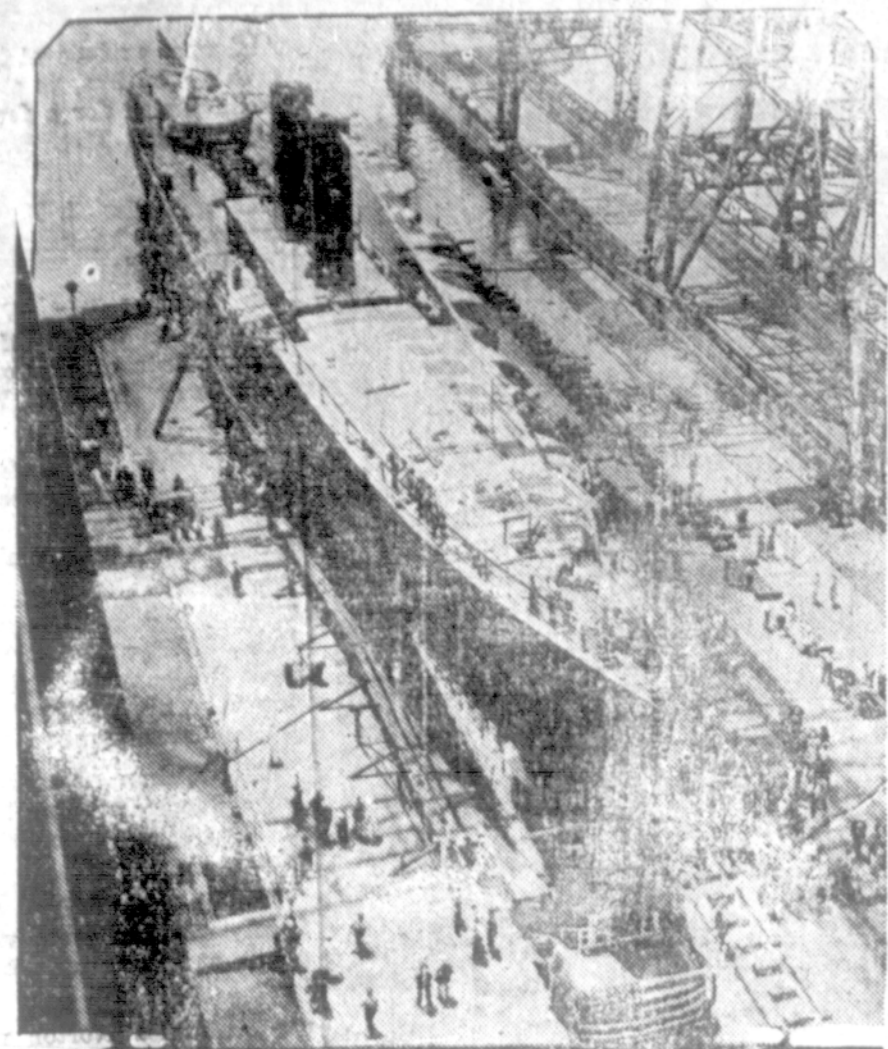


One More German Pocket Battleship

Student Funds Will Be Available This Fall

Federal funds for assisting students of Oregon colleges through labor relief will again be available for the coming year, according to notification received by E. B. Lemon, registrar at Oregon State college. Funds for a limited number of students will be distributed through the state emergency relief administration.

The percentage quota allowed will permit 24 students to obtain aid not to exceed \$20. per month and an average of not to exceed \$15. a month. Half of those receiving this work must not have been in any college or university last January. Applications are being received now by the registrar from those who would not be able to attend or continue in college

without such aid. Character and scholastic records are considered.

Frozen Peach Cream
2 cups peach pulp
Juice from 1-2 lemon
1 cup sugar
1 cup whipping cream
1 cup thin cream
1 tsp. vanilla
Add lemon juice and sugar to the peach pulp. Add cream and vanilla and pour into the freezer. Freeze using 3 parts ice to one part. When frozen remove dasher, pack in salt and ice and let stand 3 to 4 hours. This cream may be frozen in an electrical refrigerator tray by the following method. Soak 1 tbsp. of gelatin in 3 tbsp. of cold water for five minutes. Dissolve over hot water and add to the sweetened peach pulp. When slightly thickened add thin cream and fold in the whipped cream. Add vanilla and pour into the refrigerator tray and freeze 2 to 4 hours.

Peach Mousse (for 6)
1 cup peach pulp
1-2 cup powdered sugar
1-4 tsp. almond
1-2 tsp. vanilla
1-4 tsp. salt
1 cup whipping cream
Whip the cream only until thick but not stiff. Fold in the fruit, which has been thoroughly mixed with the sugar, flavoring and salt. Place in the tray of an automatic refrigerator for 4 hours or in tightly covered molds and bury in ice and salt for at least 4 hours.
