(Continued from page one) ed important in the stock judged. Hogs, sheep, beef cattle, dairy cattle and colts were all shown with as much quality being displayed as in other days.

The beef class probably demanded the greatest interest due to the size of the clubs taking this branch of the work. Judging resulted in Ronald Powell being declared winner with an Aberdeen Angus steer. All others were Herford and Frank Sayrs had the top one of the white faces. Roy Phillippi, who sold the Herford to the children explained that remarkable development had been made in the calves since spring when they were bought. Powell's entry was from the Congdon Battles herd of Yakima.

Two classes of horses were shown, the draft class and the saddlers. The Fraser family, Gordon and Dorothy, won first and second in the heavy class and a colt sired by the government horse kept at the Helyer ranch won first in the light group. Men were surprised at the number of good looking saddle animals on display.

There were stock judging teams in competition, showmanship contests, designed to give the children training in handling their animals and each group was composed of eager and hard working lads and lassies who had spent hours training their entries to stand, lead and show to the best advantage.

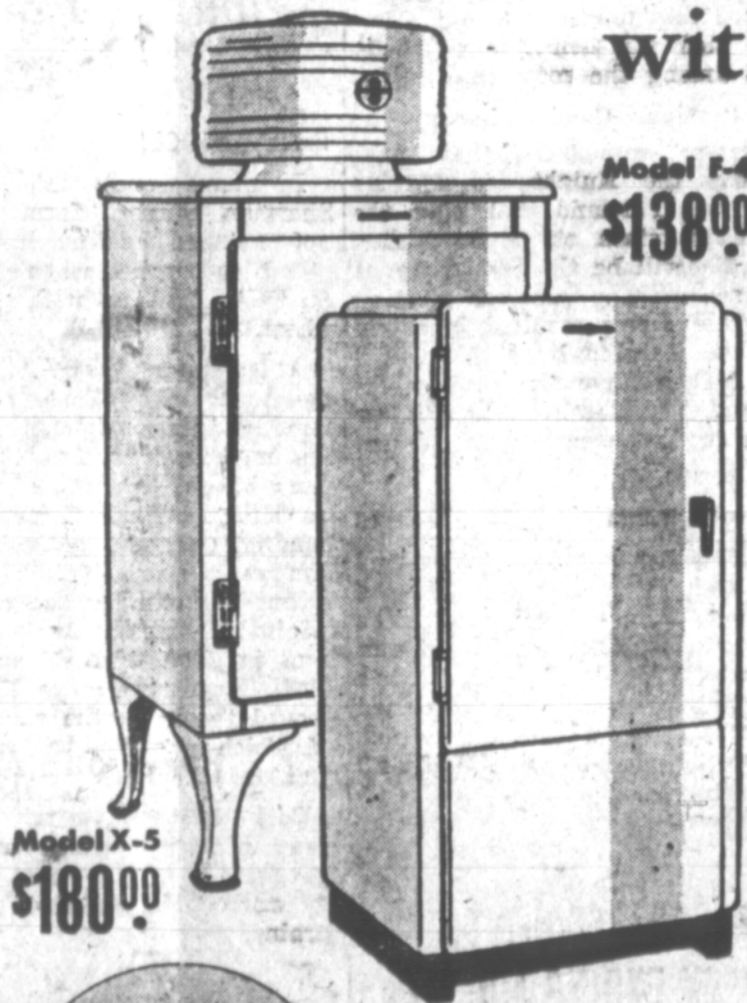
